Tobacco sales hit 7,686,526 pounds for \$4,352,772 in first eleven days

At the end of eleven selling days through Tuesday night, August 12, the Statesboro tobacco market had sold 7,686,526 pounds of tobacco for \$4,352,772.19 for a season's average of \$56.63 per hundred pounds.

Rep. Preston's tax venue bill is signed

President Eisenhower signed into law Wednesday last week a bill permitting the defendant in a federal income tax case to be tried in his home judicial circuit.

The bill was authored, introduced and pushed through the House by Rep. Preston of Statesboro, Ga., and then passed the Senate a few days ago.

It permits a person charged with violating internal revenue laws, where use of the mails is involved, to be tried in the district in which he was residing when the alleged offense was committed.

To illustrate such venue, the defendant must file motion for within 20 days after his arraignment or indictment.

Persons charged with federal income tax law violations usually are indicted by a federal court in the residence of the tax collector. Under the old law this meant the defendant also had to stand trial in that circuit, often far away from home.

The Preston act will eliminate the requirement which he charged often caused undue expense and hardship on the defendant.

In urging House approval of this bill, the Georgian said that taxpayers charged with such an offense often had to go even to a distant state to face trial before a jury of total strangers who knew nothing of the defendant's reputation and character.

The bill as approved and now signed into law, Preston said, will guarantee the defendant his right, under the sixth amendment to the public trial by an impartial jury of the state and district in which the alleged crime was committed.
