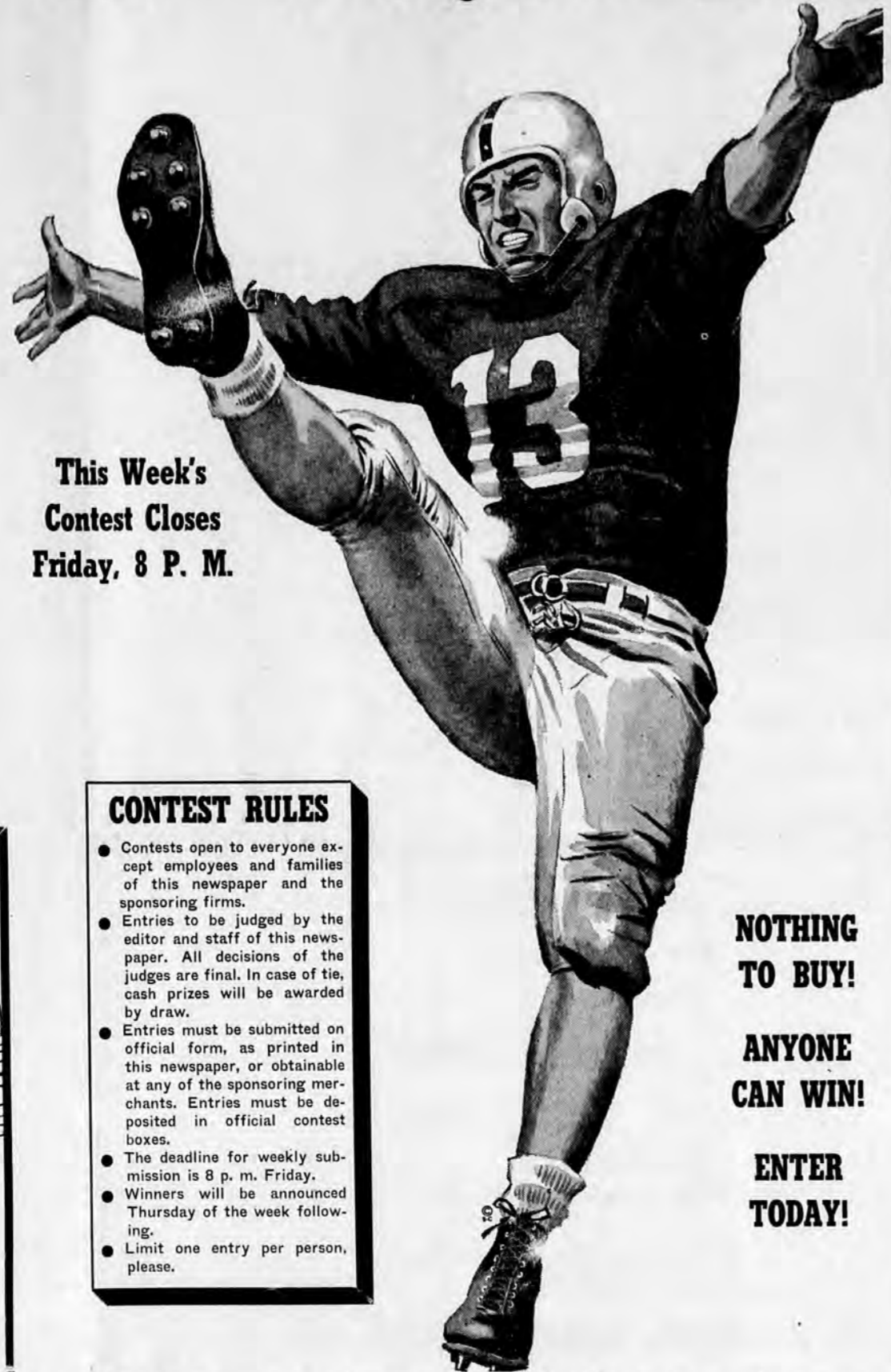

The voters in the First Congressional District endorsed Congressman Prince H. Preston for another term in our National Congress with a 10,594 majority over his only opponent Elliott Hagan in the September 10 primary.

Representative Preston received 35,370 votes to Mr. Hagan's 24,876. Mr. Preston carried fifteen of the district's eighteen counties under the county unit system to win the nomination. Those he lost are Screven, Effingham and Treutlen.

Mr. Preston announced today that the First District Democratic Nominating Convention will be held in the courthouse here tomorrow at 10:30 a. m.

Fordham polled 2,375 votes to 2,242 for Ellis in a hotly contested campaign. Ellis carried seven of the twelve precincts, but the Statesboro district gave Fordham a 324 majority.

Francis Allen, unopposed to succeed himself, received 4,645 votes for Ellis in a hotly contested campaign. Ellis carried seven of the twelve precincts, but the Statesboro district gave Fordham a 324 majority.

Farm Fillers

VITAMINS
The two vitamins most likely to be found short among farm people are A, found in dark green and deep yellow vegetables, and the citrus fruit vitamin C, according to the U.S.D.A. survey on food consumption. Farm folks have more than city families of all other nutrients.

The grade of an egg refers to its quality says Extension consumer information specialists. During 1957, only 19 of Georgia's 159 counties had no commercial broiler production, Extension poultrymen report.

Extension agronomists point out that because Bahia grass seed are easily spread over a farm by cattle the grass may become a pest in cultivated fields.

In Georgia, 149 counties have organized fire protection units, according to Extension foresters. Georgia leads the South in pulpwood production harvesting about 4 million cords annually, report Extension foresters.

County agent gives advice on handling stored grain

FUMIGATION OF STORED GRAIN

With corn harvesting time at hand I want to pass along this information on the fumigation of stored grain from Extension Entomologist C. R. Jordan.

Grain in storage should be fumigated to kill various insect pests which destroy the grain or make it unfit for human consumption. Remember that the fumigation kills the insects present but does not protect grain against reinfestation. Therefore, grain should be inspected frequently to see when additional fumigations are necessary.

Storage bins must be almost airtight for effective and economical fumigation. Loosely constructed buildings can be made tight by lining with builders paper. A tarpaulin or other cover spread over surface of the grain after fumigation is applied will help.

To be fumigated properly, corn must be shucked and shelled. The top surface of the grain should be level and not more than six inches to the ceiling.

STORAGE IN WOODEN BINS

The following fumigants and dosages are recommended for storage in wooden bins. In steel bins these dosages may be reduced 50 per cent for small grain and 20 per cent for corn and grain sorghum.

Fumigant No. 1 — 4 parts carbon tetrachloride plus 1 part carbon disulfide—dosage in gallons per 1,000 bushels—small grain, 3; sorghum, 8; shelled corn, 6.

Fumigant No. 2 — 1 part carbon tetrachloride plus 3 parts ethylene dichloride—dosage in gallons per 1,000 bushels—small grain, 6; sorghum, 10; shelled corn, 4.

Both these mixtures are available commercially.

If the grain is to be used for feed, use fumigant No. 2. Some injury to germination may result when Fumigant No. 1 is used if moisture content of grain is over 12 per cent.

The door of the bin should be sealed after the fumigant is applied and marked so that no one will enter and be exposed accidentally to the vapor. After 72 hours open the bin and allow grain to aerate thoroughly.

TREATING SMALL AMOUNTS

Small quantities of grain, beans, or peas can be fumigated effectively in drums, barrels, or lard cans. In a 50-gallon drum or barrel use one-half pint or a one-third mixture of carbon tetrachloride — ethylene dichloride or use two table-spoons of this mixture in a 50-pound lard can.

Sprinkle the appropriate amount of fumigant over the surface of the grain and cover with canvas or sacks. Allow 72 hours for fumigation and then aerate thoroughly.

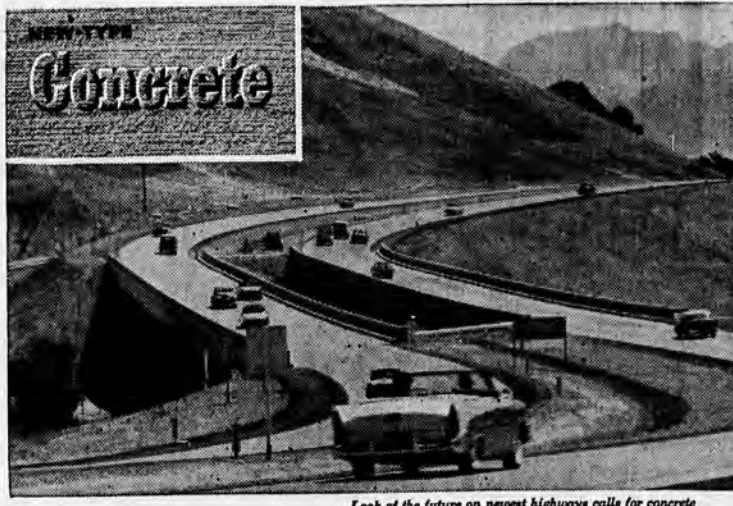
