Credit life insurance offered by Land Bank

Arrangements have been completed whereby all eligible persons under the age of 66, who have loans with The Federal Land Bank of Columbia, may now obtain credit life insurance, according to an announcement by T. W. Rowe, secretary-treasurer of the Statesboro National Farm Loan Association, which handles the making and servicing of all loans for The Federal Land Bank of Columbia in this area.

Life insurance will be directly related to the size of the loan up to a maximum of \$10,000 of insurance. The insurance is entirely optional and if anyone becomes insured he desires to discontinue the coverage it may be cancelled at the end of the insurance year, Mr. Rowe stated.

"Our credit life insurance plan was developed as an additional service to Land Bank borrowers at the request of the national farm loan associations in the Columbia Farm Credit District, composed of Florida, Georgia, North and South Carolina," Mr. Rowe said.

Tractor clinic to be held at Register

More than twenty farmers have enrolled in a "Tractor Maintenance Clinic" to be held in the Register community Thursday night and Friday, September 25 and 26.

The group will meet Thursday night at Register School at 8 o'clock to make plans for tractor maintenance service on their tractor the following day. A film and discussion will bring out the importance of proper care of farm tractors to prevent costly repairs.

Tractors brought in on Friday will be cleaned and checked over. Adjustments will be made where practical on ignition system, carburetor and air induction system, cooling system, breaks and clutch.

Assisting in the clinic will be J. L. McCullough, special vocational agriculture teacher, Swainsboro, and mechanics from local tractor dealers. Bulloch County vocational agriculture teachers organizing the clinic are O. E. Gay and J. P. Folds.

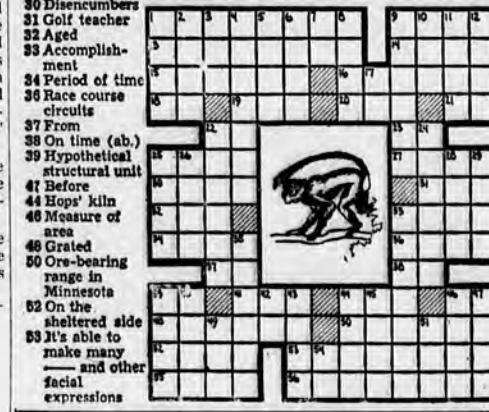

Man-of-Year in Soil to be named Oct. 23

Mr. A. D. Clifton, chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District, announced that the eighth annual "Man of the Year in Soil Conservation" program will be held in Springfield, Georgia this year. This program is sponsored jointly by the Ogeechee River District and the banks in the six counties, Bulloch, Camden, Effingham, Evans, Screven, and Tattnall, which make up the district. The sponsoring banks are: Metter Banking Company, the Claxton Bank, Tipton Banking Company, Claxton; Glenville Bank, Citizens Bank, Glenville; Tattall Bank, Reidsville; Brown Banking Company, Cobbleton; Bank of Screven County, Sylvania; Farmers and Merchants Bank, Sylvania; Bank of Newington; Exchange Bank of Springfield; Sea Island Bank, Statesboro; Bulloch County Bank, Statesboro; Farmers and Merchants Bank, Brooklet; and Farmers and Merchants Bank, Portola.

This program recognizes the outstanding soil conservation farmer in each county of the district. The Agricultural Committee, appointed by the district supervisors, selects the man in each county to receive the award. This farmer is selected on the basis of outstanding accomplishments in soil and water conservation, general farming ability, leadership, character and other qualities which make for a leading farmer. This year's program will be held in the Effingham County High School cafeteria on Thursday, October 23, and will have as their speaker Hon. Herr Talmadge, U. S. Senator from Georgia. Senator Talmadge is a graduate of the University of Georgia, College of Agriculture, and former Governor of Georgia. He has always been very active in the affairs of the farmer and is a soil conservation farmer himself.

Mental health group raise half of goal

Johnson Black, president of the Bulloch County Mental Health Association, announced this week that the association has secured \$1,500 of the \$3,000 designated as Bulloch County's share in the cost of a mental health clinic for Bulloch County. The association here, working together with associations in Camden, Effingham, Emanuel and Evans Counties, plans to provide a mental health clinic for children. A tentative budget has been worked out and costs of the clinic has been prorated to each of the five counties according to size and amount of services provided. A psychiatrist and psychologist are available locally, which will enable the clinic to begin functioning, when funds are available. "The \$1,500 which has been contributed has come from civic, social and fraternal organizations and from individuals. Efforts continue to increase individual contributions and to encourage clubs to participate in this move to make Bulloch County a healthier and happier place in which to live," Mr. Black said.

Rep. Preston urges soil bank to extend sign-up deadline date

Rep. Prince H. Preston has asked for an extension of the present October 3 deadline that farmers may sign up for the conservation reserve phase of the Soil Bank program. In a letter to Mr. Howard J. Doggett, director of the Soil Bank division of the Agriculture Department, the congressman asked that this deadline be extended through November. "A number of farmers have complained to me as to the October 3 deadline for signing up under the conservation reserve program is too early since A.S.C. county officials have been taking these requests only since September 2," Mr. Preston wrote Doggett. "This period of time seems entirely too short to permit the farmers to make adequate plans," he said. "In fact, many of our farmers are too busy harvesting their 1958 crops to make proper plans at this time." "This being true, I strongly urge that the sign-up period be extended through November, at least," he said. "This was the third time this year that Mr. Preston sought relief for farmers under the Soil Bank program. Twice before he was successful. Early this year he teamed up with Senator Richard B. Russell and succeeded in getting Agriculture officials to reopen the program for farmers who had not already signed up for funds under the plan. Towards the end of the last session of Congress he actively supported a bill which provided additional Soil Bank funds after payments had been halted because of lack of money.

Max Lockwood, Statesboro Recreation Director, was elected a member of the National Recreation Society's national administrative council, at the annual meeting of the National Recreation Congress in Atlantic City Wednesday, September 24. Lockwood, who is chairman of the Georgia Recreation Council, was attending the congress as a personal representative of Governor Marvin Griffin. He will represent the southeastern United States on the council.
