hear program on heart strokes

The Senior Woman's Club of Statesboro, Georgia, was opened on October 16, 1958, at 3:30 p. m. at the Recreation Center by Mrs. Ben Deal, who offered a prayer. Mrs. J. E. Bowen Jr. presided. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was then repeated, and the Georgia State Song sung.

The Federation of Women's Clubs is asking \$3.25 per capita for the Tallulah Falls School. We hope the Senior Woman's Club can bring in their quota, because that will help toward making our total mark of achievement higher.

Mrs. W. A. Porterfield of the education department, had charge of getting the speaker, and introducing him. This was the last official act in that capacity, for they are leaving Statesboro to go to Tulsa, Oklahoma—a great loss for us.

Dr. Lamont Rangiz of Savannah, who has written seventeen scientific papers and who is on the staff at the Clare Henderson Memorial Center—a rehabilitation center for cardiovascular victims—spoke on the subject, "Strokes." A film was shown, and then Dr. Rangiz filled in where the film did not make things clear enough. He claimed that a lot of people had small strokes and were not aware of them. If they were to the doctor in time, there were treatments that could help. Even if a major "stroke" occurred, rehabilitation could bring the part of the body affected into use again.

This is where those around the patient—the doctor, the nurse, and the family, can help the most. The patient, too, must not give up, but the family, in this case, can raise the morale of the patient so much that he is willing to work harder at his rehabilitation.

Passive exercises, to keep the blood supply going to the affected parts, cheerfulness, and optimism are great factors toward getting the patient well. The doctor can administer medicine that keeps further strokes from forming. If a clot has formed in a part of the body which is easily accessible, surgery can be resorted to.

Research is trying to ascertain what causes hardening of the arteries—the main cause of strokes. If that is known, this disease can be treated and cured. Funds are needed for research work, and it behooves the public to help out, because cardiovascular disease is the greatest killer of all diseases.


