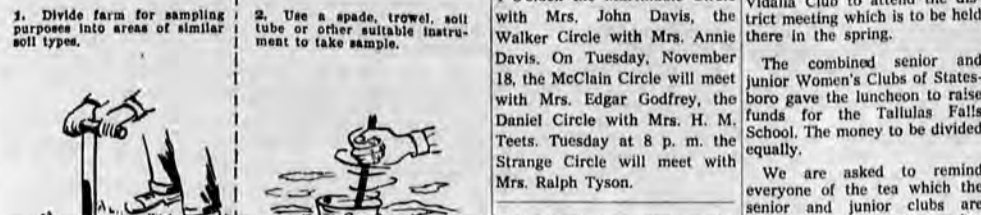

City of Statesboro to get newest type of street sweeping machine

Mayor W. A. Bowen announced this week that the Mayor and City Council have approved the purchase of an Elgin Street-King motor driven pick-up street sweeper. Delivery is expected within the next 15 days, and the Atlantic Engineering Company, Elgin representative, will send their personnel from Atlanta to instruct the city operator in its maintenance and care.

This new sweeper is similar to those in use in Savannah, Millen, Sylvania, Waynesboro, and other neighboring towns. It is hydraulically operated, and equipped with a weatherproof cab painted white. It has a capacity of sweeping up and carrying four cubic yards to the disposal site in one load. The increased efficiency of the new machine will result in better cleaning of the city streets, and will enable more economical operation.

Corn referendum set for Nov. 25

A corn referendum will be held November 25 according to V. J. Rowe, chairman of the Bulloch Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Any person who was entitled to share in the proceeds of the 1958 corn crop in the commercial corn area as an owner-operator, cash tenant, standstill or fixed-rent tenant, landlord or a share tenant, or share-cropper will be eligible to vote. Corn will be weighed out at the county seat.

Polls will be located in each militia district and will be the same as those used in regular elections.

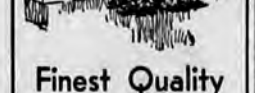
