



Livestick accounts for a large part of Georgia's farm income and good pastures are the cheapest source of livestick feed. To supply this feed, most leading farmers have year-round grazing systems worked out now. Such a system should include a summer growing pasture plant such as Coastal Bermuda grass. Dallas grass may be used on now, moist areas.
