Herman Talmadge Reports From Washington

IT WILL BE interesting to see what kind of report is submitted by the Special Presidential Committee now engaged in evaluating this country's foreign aid program.

Headed by William H. Draper Jr., who is best known for his role as director of the Berlin airlift, the Committee was named by President Eisenhower last November to help him prepare the mutual security spending recommendations he will make to the First Session of the 86th Congress. Although created specifically to appraise the worth of American military assistance, the panel of outstanding business and military leaders also was authorized to weigh the various economic development projects and to determine the "relative emphasis" which should be given to the military and economic phases of foreign aid.

THERE HAVE BEEN a number of such studies in the past but, unfortunately, most of them did little more than issue general reports which sought to whitewash the existing program and to trade on the prominence of their members to propaganda the worth of American military assistance. The panel of outstanding business and military leaders also was authorized to weigh the various economic development projects and to determine the "relative emphasis" which should be given to the military and economic phases of foreign aid.

Foreign aid which strengthens the defense posture of this country and economic assistance which helps dependable allies in their struggle to maintain their large and effective armies in defense of the

It wasn't the preacher's fault that he didn't get through to us Sunday morning at church. He preached a good sermon, I know, for others who heard him said he did.

But we just didn't hear what he had to say. We were looking at him but he wasn't getting through. And it was our fault.

FOR YOU SEE, we had taken a couple of Chlor-trimeceton tablets to ease off a case of hay fever and we were still under the drowsy effects of the anti-histamine. We really could have stayed home from church and drifted off to sleep on the couch and felt perfectly justified in that course. We elected to go to church. However, we could have put the Chlor-trimeceton tablets, and sat in church alert and paying attention to what the preacher was saying, allowing it to get through to us. But to have chosen this course would have been to submit our paw neighbors to the nose-blowing and nose-pulling and stuffing of cleaning tissues in our church suit pocket which accompanies a case of hay fever. And that would have been unkind. It would have distracted others to whom the preacher needed to get through. It might even have distracted the preacher.

So WE ELECTED the other course. We took the tablets to ease off the hay fever, went to church, and sat there, in a drowsy haze, not bothering anybody. But we were at church, and we did sing the songs, for that was a diversion and that sort of compensated for what we missed of what the preacher said.

And if there are any of our readers who suggest that all this is just a feeble excuse for our being sleepy in church and attempting to justify our drowsiness by bringing in the hay fever and the anti-histamine tablets and all that, then let us remind them that spring is just about here—officially it is upon us on March 21—and you may be needing a better one than we're submitting to explain why the preacher is not getting through to you one fine spring Sunday.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON we went walking in our neighborhood and came upon a sign of real tragedy. A length of kite string lay on the ground and a tattered kite flapping over the power lines overhead. There was the evidence of a sad ending of what began as an exciting event—a flying kite.

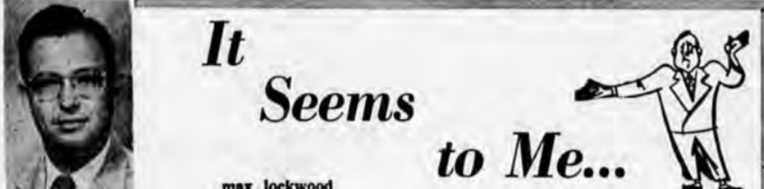
Now, kite-flying was one of our favorite sports when we were a kid. We made our own kites from the ground and a torn three-foot of tail, and not a knot in it. Our kite tails were generally made up of three to four lengths of bad string each tied together with a big

knot with long ends. Regular store wrapping string was not strong enough for our kites. We had to have that tight-twisted kind that brick layers used to make a straight line.

AND WE HAD to have a lot of open spaces to get our kite into the air. Back of the present Statesboro High School building was a fine place, before it built up. We had someone to hold the kite while we let out a hundred yards of more of cord. When we were ready we would yell, "Pleeeeee!" and we would take off like Moody's Goose with our right arm stretched upright and our head turned to see if the kite was "catching the wind." If it was and it was climbing, we would slow down and turn to face the kite and begin "paying out" cord. If the wind was steady and the kite pulled strong on its cord, then you had a successful launching. Soon you had it high enough that you backed off and found a place to sit down and you "leter go out of sight."

No launching of an Atlas at Cape Canaveral was as thrilling to today's scientists as the successful kite flight was to us when we were a kid.

Oh it was wonderful. If there's a good wind up Saturday we might just make us a kite and go fly it.
