Wailing sirens and a motorcycle escort heralded the arrival in Statesboro last week of the city's new fire truck. The truck was driven from the point of manufacture in Kenosha, Wisconsin, by Claud McClamery of the Statesboro Fire Department.

Bids had been taken by the mayor and council for this equipment and the contract awarded the low bidder, Peter Pirsch and Sons Company. McClamery was accompanied to the factory to pick up the truck by J. Rufus Anderson, chairman of the fire committee of the City Council.

Cliff Everett of the Everett Motor Company was the successful bidder furnishing the Dodge chassis on which the new fire truck is built.

The truck, a 750 g.p.m. pumper with a conventional Dodge chassis, boasts all the latest features in fire fighting equipment. Factory representatives of Peter Pirsch and Sons Company were in Statesboro Tuesday to give instruction in the operation and handling of this equipment to personnel of the Statesboro Fire Department.

Mayor W. A. Bowen, speaking for members of the City Council, pointed out that the addition of this fire truck to the city fire department will put Statesboro far ahead of many other towns of comparable size in the degree and type of fire protection afforded its citizens.

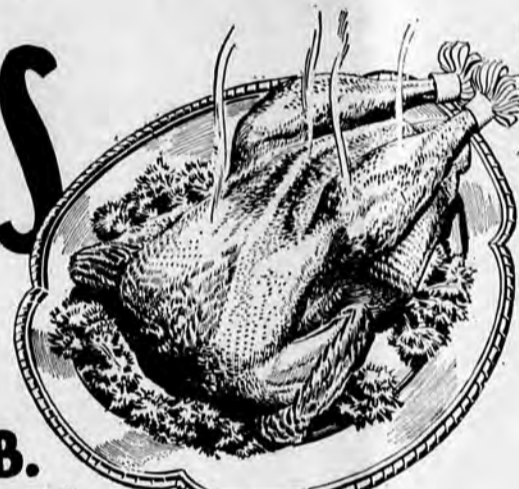
