The Luckless Legion

An estimated 900,000 young men and women will come of driving age during 1959. If they all become drivers and follow the tragic path of today's young motorists, 243,000 of them will be involved in a highway accident that kills someone.

Of course this will not happen because all 900,000 will not become licensed drivers this year. Perhaps this is because so many fearful parents have read the grim figures of what's happening to these young drivers under 25 years of age.

In its new highway safety booklet, "The Luckless Legion," The Travelers' Insurance Companies report that during 1958 these drivers under age 25, who make up less than 14 per cent of all licensed drivers, were involved in 27 per cent of the fatal highway accidents and 20 per cent of the non-fatal crashes that perhaps maimed someone for life.

It does not take a mathematician to conclude that their record was twice as bad as their numbers would warrant.

Where does the responsibility rest for this shocking condition? Is it with the schools, the parents, traffic authorities, or these young men and women themselves?

We feel it is a combination of all these things. More schools must provide driver-training instruction, many more parents must face up to this problem that could cost the life of their children, traffic courts must "get tougher" and most important, the young drivers must realize that tragedy will strike as a result of thoughtless actions behind the wheel.

Herman Talmadge Reports From Washington

THE REAL REASON for the Russian agitation over West Berlin is that it stands as a monumental example of the Soviet failure to convert the German people to Communism.

Eugene W. Castle—author, industrialist and world traveler—has given us in his true perspective in a recent magazine article in which he wrote "Berlin is an enclave of Western ideas and demonstrated economic superiority through 100 miles inside the Iron Curtain area. It belies all the propaganda by which Communism hoped to win the German people."

And of this number the drivers of 31 were arrested for violation of some traffic law. Fourteen were found to be driving without a driver's license. Twelve were driving with improper tag or no tag. Five were found to have been violating other requirements of the traffic law.

These unannounced spot checks will do a great deal to keep motorists on their toes. It will help drivers exercise more care in the manner in which they use our highways.

We commend the State Patrol for making these spot checks and hope that they will continue.

The Editor's Uneasy Chair



When the captain of "The Wanderer," the last ship to bring slaves direct from Africa to the United States, landed his human cargo on Jekyll Island in November 1858, he could not know that one hundred years later the name of his ship would identify one of the finest beach resort motels on the Atlantic coast.

Nor could William Horton, who built a two-story home of tabby construction in 1796, know that 222 years later in 1958, a wide hard surfaced road would run by his home on which high powered machines would transport thousands of people from all over the world.

And how were the members of the Jekyll Island Club, including William G. Rockefeller, John P. Morgan, George F. Baker, Edwin Gould, Goodyear, Vanderbilt, Pierre Lorillard and many other millionaires, to know that when they sold it to the State of Georgia in 1947, that twelve years later in 1959 it would be one of the finest state recreation areas in the nation.

And old Melvin Thompson who promoted the purchase of the island while he was governor, dream of the tremendous future of the island?

Except for the sorry period when the island became entangled in state politics the story of Jekyll Island is one to fascinate all Georgians, and even

that period adds to its rich history. Regardless of what has gone before in the history of the island, the owners and management of the motel which bears the name of that ship, "The Wanderer," visualize Jekyll as being one of the great beach playgrounds in the United States.

Nowhere on the east or west coast have we seen such a fine beach. More than nine miles of beautiful white sand, the beach is uncluttered by honky-tonk commercialism. The state wisely prohibits the sale of wine, beer and liquor on the island. It has provided thousands of picnic tables in scores of locations all around the island. There are miles and miles of fine highways. Free bath houses line the beach. A concrete walkway stretches thousands of yards along the beachfront.

The homes of the millionaires still stand to proclaim the elegance of the Jekyll Island Club. A museum brings the edwardian era with the present time.

And "The Wanderer" motel, with its present 100 units and scores more under construction, is Georgia's largest resort. Sam Wells, manager of the Wanderer, spills over with enthusiasm for Jekyll, when you register at the desk. He knows himself out to make sure you are "to home" while there. Sam is an "island" man, having been

manager of the Cloister on Sea Island for years before he moved over to Jekyll. He is a member of the Brunswick Rotary Club. He practices the ideals instilled in him by his Rotary experiences.

C. G. Wilcox, public relations director for the Seaside Investment Company, which owns the Wanderer, breathes and lives Jekyll Island.

And if you should meet Evelyn Wade, the housekeeper, and talk to her long enough you'll find that you and she have mutual friends over the state of Georgia.

You can see we're a convert. If you're itching to get off for a weekend you can't beat Jekyll Island. And you'll be right to book at the Wanderer. But you better write Mr. Sam Wells for "Mother-Daughter, Father-Son" Banquet.



Outlook favorable for 1959
Rockwell tells shareholders

The combination of an upsurge in the national economy and the effects of the recent Supreme Court reversal of the Memphis decision bring about a favorable outlook for operations of Rockwell Manufacturing Co. in 1959, W. F. Rockwell Jr., president, reported to shareholders last week.



"With the Memphis case resolved, the way was cleared for the long delayed expansion on the part of the natural gas pipeline industry," Mr. Rockwell said. "The immediate effect of the decision was a rush by the gas transmission industries to the Federal Power Commission with more than \$1 billion in plans for expanding pipelines and the compressor stations needed to push gas through the lines."

Rockwell Manufacturing Company is a leading supplier of valves, pressure regulators and meters used by the gas industry, as well as power tools, water meters, parking meters, voting machines and taxi meters. As previously reported, Rockwell in 1958 experienced a 12 per cent decrease in sales from the record high of the previous year. Sales were \$107,055,012 compared with \$122,358,159 in 1957. Earnings were \$7,418,993, equal to \$2.14 per common share (adjusted to reflect a 4 per cent stock dividend paid in January 1958) and a 50 per cent stock dividend paid in December 1958. In 1957, earnings were \$9,647,761, equal to \$2.80 per share on an adjusted basis.

Woman's Club hears Bulloch County solicitor

The Senior Woman's Club of Statesboro heard Walton Usher, solicitor of the Bulloch Superior Court, explain the functions of the juvenile court at the Club's April 16 meeting.

He cited several cases which have come before the local court over which Judge J. L. Renfro presides. He told the members of the club that a person under seventeen years of age is considered, by the court, to be a child, but added that anyone from fifteen to seventeen years of age could be prosecuted. He pointed out that children who violate municipal, state or federal laws can be incarcerated. He defined "misdemeanor" and "felony."

"If a child commits a felony, he is taken first to the juvenile court and then if they can't take care of the child there, he or she is sent to a superior court from which he or she can be placed in the penitentiary," he said.

He cited some cases where parents could not control their children and how the courts handled them.

He commended Bulloch County saying that it is an outstanding county in which there is less violation of law than elsewhere.

Mrs. J. E. Bowen presided at the meeting.

The club contributed \$100 to the Statesboro Regional Library in observance of National Library Week.

It was announced that membership dues could be brought in next month.

Mrs. Edna Hoefel reviewed the recent state convention held in Statesboro.

Mrs. Dean Futch, chairman of the Public Affairs Committee was in charge of the program. The theme of it was "Actively Sharing Knowledge." She presented Mr. Usher as the guest speaker.

Frank I. Williams Youth Center Is Nearing Completion At GTC

The New Frank I. Williams Youth Center is nearing completion at a cost of between \$550,000 and \$600,000 at Georgia Teachers College Campus.

The new Frank I. Williams youth center is expected to be ready for a September opening, says Clarence Mobley, contractor, and also Logan and Williams, architects.

The building will be called the Frank I. Williams Center because he was a longtime citizen of this community and because of the work done for the school by his son, Regent Everett Williams.

"We are really honoring Everett Williams through his father," states President Zach S. Henderson.

The greater part of the first floor of the building is taken up by the dining area, which will seat 400 or more students at one time and feed 800 or more in less than an hour. The main floor also contains a reading room, writing room, six possible conference rooms, a Student Council room, a yearbook staff room, a visitor's lounge, and a porch.

Downstairs is to be found the post office with its lobby, the book store, a snack bar, a large recreation and game room, and also an audio-visual department with offices, film storage space, and a film-viewing room.

President Henderson states that the school plans to keep the snack bar and game room areas open to students from 8 p. m. to 10 p. m.
