well had few free hours. He attended classes from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. and spent every afternoon in the cost-analysis section of his father's plant.

The younger Rockwell moved from department to department to learn all phases of the business. He spent some time abroad studying European manufacturing techniques and also spent a year learning Standard Steel Spring's Detroit and that of Timken-Burlingame.

In 1940, Mr. Rockwell's ten-year training period was cut to five. He was elected vice president and controller of Rockwell Manufacturing, when those offices occupied because of retirement of a senior executive of the company, Rockwell Manufacturing was valued at \$1,177,000, when Mr. Rockwell took over, to \$107,000,000 in 1958, while earnings before the end of 1946 and last year jumped to \$7,417,000 from \$1,177,000. 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STILL Plans to Grow

We should be investing that \$18,000,000 more rapidly," Mr. Rockwell observed. He acknowledged that he was looking at "eight or nine" situations any one of which could fit into the company's operations.

Mr. Rockwell is a pleasant-spoken man of 44, a six-footer with gray hair. He keeps his weight by dieting; he can't take time for golf because he needs it to keep up with the children.
