Early cotton blooms pay off for young Harry Brunson

Discovery of early cotton blooms in Bulloch County paid off Tuesday of this week when Harry Brunson, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Brunson of R.F.D. 6, found three full blown cotton blossoms in a tract of eighteen and one-half acres of cotton owned by his father on the farm of Mr. C. A. Simmons.

The three blossoms found by young Brunson are believed to be the first in the county. He discovered the first blossoms on his father's place last year on June 6.

Mr. Simmons presented young Brunson a dollar bill for his discovery.

The field of cotton was planted the week of March 25. It has been poisoned once. The cotton was from Coker 100 seed.

Young Brunson is thirteen years old and a member of the 4-H club at Southeast Bulloch High School where he will be in the eighth grade next school year.

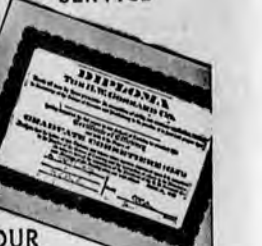

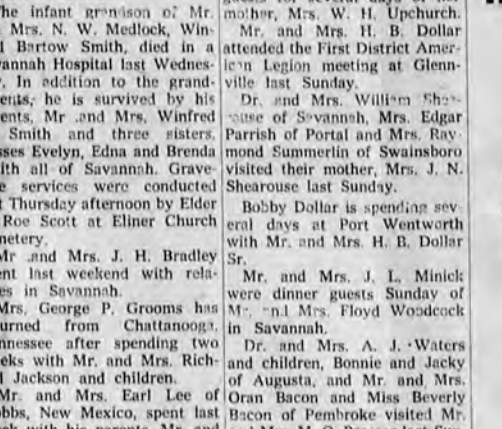
