

Some good cotton yields were obtained last year, but until the Georgia Crop Reporting Service made a recent report on these yields, few people realized that 200 Georgia counties averaged a bale or more per acre, Bulloch County farmers averaged almost 500 pounds of cotton per acre, with a gross weight of 1 bale per acre.

This year's cotton prospects aren't as good as last year's. In some areas stands have been spotted. Seedling d is e a s e s damaged some fields, and heavy rainfalls in April and May leached out a lot of nitrogen and potash, Grass and weeds have been a bigger problem than in most years. Mr. Cobb came to Statesboro in 1928 from Rocky Mount, North Carolina, where he had operated a tobacco warehouse since 1915.

During the thirty years Mr. Cobb operated on the Statesboro market he made friends all over this section of the bright leaf tobacco belt. He understood growers' problems and was their constant advisor and helper. All his energies were devoted to improving the Statesboro market for the benefit of the growers in this area.

He married the former Mrs. Willie Olliff Groover and Statesboro became his second home. He was as interested in the affairs of our community as those who were born and reared here. Willis Cobb will be remembered

The Georgia law gives the Commissioner of Agriculture the authority to override the board's

Because of complaints about the original date of July 16 set by the board of governors this year, Commissioner of Agriculture Phil Campbell changed the date to July

To prevent this annual dissension some satisfactory method should be worked out. It would prevent hard feelings among growers and warehousemen and result in better relations all round.
