



The G.T.C. Story from 1908 to date

Georgia Teachers College, today one of the leading teachers colleges in the nation was not always Georgia Teachers College

The college's history begins as one of ten district agricultural and mechanical schools established through a legislative bill introduced by H. H. Perry of Hall County and supported by Governor Joseph H. Terrell and signed into law on August 18, 1906.

To assure the location of the First District school Statesboro the citizens of the county and the town, under the leadership of Colonel Albert M. Deal, offered 275 acres of land, \$25,000 in cash, and free electricity and water for ten years.

In the beginning there were no appropriations made by the state for maintenance of the new school, however provision was made that all funds derived from fertilizer and oil inspection fees would be utilized for the support of the district schools. This arrangement was unsatisfactory and was replaced in 1911 by an






