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





Bulloch County citizens are being denied admittance to the Talmadge Memorial Hospital in Augusta, a state hospital, because our county "owes" fifty - nine pints of blood to the hospital.

This situation was revealed by Miss Sarah Hall of the Bulloch County Department of Public Welfare when she was notified of it by Dr. Rufus F, Payne, superintendent of the Talmadge Memorial Hospital, in a letter dated Sep-

Dr. Payne's letter begins: "I regret very much that I will not be able to accept any more applications from your county until satisfactory arrangements have been made to replace the blood which patients from your county have used. This step became necessary when we had to cancel surgery because blood was not available. We have no justification for taking blood from patients in one county and using on patients from other counties.'

According to Miss Hall the number of Bulloch County citizens who go to the state hospital in Augusta is fairly large. She points out that not all these are patients on welfare. She only has to certify the patient's residency in Bul-
