

### Things must be tough

Things in Washington must be tougher than we realize.

According to the U.S. News and World Report, from now on, the government wants the trading stamps it pays for. A new order from the General Services Administration made that clear to the more than 100,000 U.S. employees who drive on official business. All trading stamps that a driver gets when he buys gas and oil at Government expense must be turned in to the employe's supervisor.

We have before us a new catalog showing the premiums one of the leading trading stamp companies gives its stamp collectors and we don't see many items that the Government could get with their stamps that would be of much use.
