New chapel at BC work camp dedicated Sunday, January 3


Last Sunday nearly one hundred citizens of Statesboro and Bulloch County joined with fourteen Adult education in the dedication of the gleaming new chapel built







On Sunday afternoon, January 3, nearly one hundred citizens of Statesboro and Bulloch County joined in the dedication of the new chapel at the Bulloch County Public Work Camp located on U.S. 301, north of Statesboro.

The chapel, lovely in its simple dignity, came into being because a life term prisoner at the work camp wanted a Sunday school organized there. The Sunday school was organized and Josh Lanier became the teacher.

And the seed for a chapel was planted.

And the community proved to be fertile ground in which the seed might grow. The churches and people of the community cultivated it until it became a gleaming House of God surrounded by pine trees and standing at the side of the prison.

And now those prisoners whose hearts have been touched by the hand of God find a new kind of freedom-freedom of spirit and soul as they leave their prison walls to enter the doors of the House of God for the Sunday worship service.

The simple dedication ceremony closed with the following, which we believe is worthy of a place here:
