Parallel terraces with constructed and sod ded waterways almost unamously adopted by those requesting water disposal systems; and last 4, but not least by no means, use of permanent grass such as pensacola bahia grass as field borders to control weeds, protect fences and to allow better access: 1300 acres of wildlife food planted.


