First District 1960 Census office to open in Statesboro on January 22

Announcement was made this week by Thomas W. McWhirter of Atlanta, regional director of the 1960 Census of Population and Housing, that Alfred C. Mann has been named supervisor of the First District Census office located here in Statesboro.

Mr. Mann will direct a force of crew leaders and census takers in Bulloch, Bryan, Burke, Candler, Evans, Jenkins, Liberty, Long, Chatham, Effingham, Emanuel, McIntosh, Montgomery, Screven, Tatnall, Toombs, Treutlen and Wheeler counties. The regional office is in Atlanta.

The district office for the first district is located in Statesboro at North Main Street and Parrish Street in the building formerly occupied by the Northside Grocery, operated by Bill Franklin. The office will be open on January 22. According to information released by Senator Herman Matlock on January 9 from Washington, twenty-two crew leaders and 360 enumerators will be hired at this office here. Mr. Mann, as district supervisor, will work under the general direction of the permanent regional field directors and will be responsible for all phases of the census in his district. His duties include the recruiting of the crew leaders, obtaining and supervising of the field canvass questionnaires, and direct supervision of the field canvass which will begin on April 1.

At the start of the census, all households will receive in the mail an Advance Census Report Form, a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form, which contains the basic population and housing questions, gives the family a chance to assemble information a boy or girl member in advance of the census taker's visit.

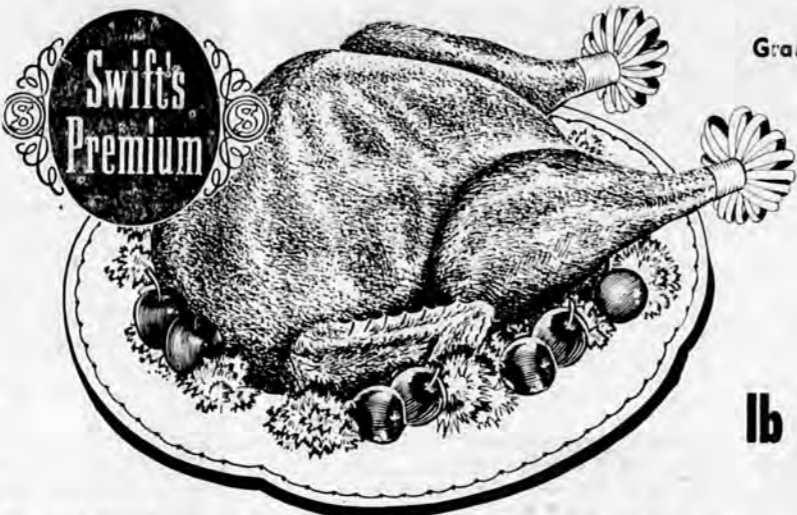

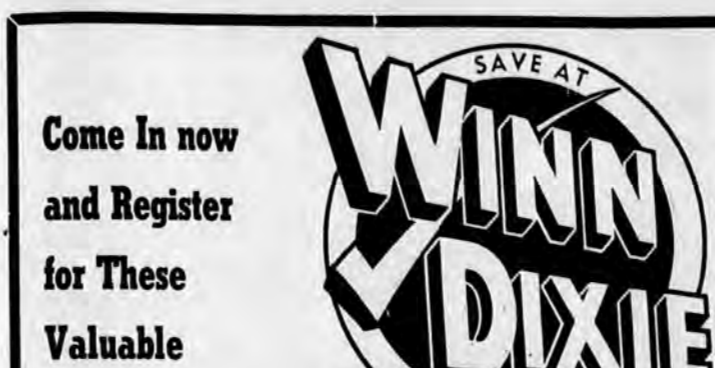
