Suggested by Ralph Swords, sophomore business major from Augusta, the nickname was adopted by a special committee last week from among 104 entries from students and faculty. Swords will receive \$10 for his winning entry.

Legislation up to put sheriff and ordinary of county on salary basis

According to a news story datelined Atlanta in Wednesday's Savannah Morning News, Francis Allen and Wiley Fordham of Bulloch County introduced local legislation Tuesday which would take Bulloch County's sheriff and ordinary off the fee system.

The legislators said the bill called for salaries of \$9,000 for the sheriff and \$6,500 for the ordinary. They estimated that both officials would get a slight reduction in pay.

The bills would raise other county commissioner's pay by \$300 per year and makes adjustments in employee's salaries in general.

Effective date of the changes would be January 1, 1961.

GSA recommends new P.O. building

Congressman Prince H. Preston announced today that the General Services Administration has recommended construction of a new \$761,000 federal building for Statesboro, Georgia. The building would house the post office and the facilities for the departments of Agriculture, Health, Education, and Welfare and the Selective Service system. The recommendation was made to the committees on public works of the Senate and House of Representatives, for their consideration.

If approved by these congressional committees, GSA would proceed with the acquisition of a site and preparation of plans for the proposed building as soon as funds are available.

The new building will contain about 28,000 square feet of gross floor area. Mr. Preston said the structure will replace the inadequate existing building erected in 1919.

The project contemplates the disposal of the existing building upon completion of the proposed new structure. Mr. Preston has worked closely with local and GSA officials in preliminary projection toward the building.

Senator Dick Russell's office in a telephone conversation with the editor of the Herald Wednesday afternoon said that Senator Russell had been advised also by the General Services Administration of its recommendation. He stated that he is all for the federal building here.

The annual meeting of the members of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Statesboro was held in the First Federal Building on North Main Street at 2:00 p.m., on January 20, 1960. A representative number of the members was present indicating their interest in the progress of their association.

First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Statesboro boosted its assets by \$863,507.00 in 1959, bringing the total as of December 31 to \$6,743,306.00. Horace Z. Smith, president, said today.

Commenting on the Association's annual report to its members, Mr. Smith said the institution holds more savings and serves more customers than ever before, and he expects to attract even more saver customers in 1960.

Mr. Smith pointed out that even though conditions did not look too favorable at the beginning of 1959, due to a tight money situation and increasing interest rates, First Federal had the largest growth in 1959 of any year in its more than 23 years existence.

Mr. Smith summarized First Federal Savings and Loan Association's 1959 operations as follows:

1. Savings increased \$708,279.00, bringing the total to \$6,223,784.00.
2. The number of savings account holders increased considerably during the year, bringing the total at the end of the year to approximately 2,300.
3. Dividend payments to savers for the use of their funds totalled \$210,366.00 or \$39,760.00 more than in 1958.
4. The home mortgage loan portfolio was increased from \$4,603,788.00 to \$5,051,933.00 more than \$24,000.00 was added to reserves bringing the total to \$448,652.00.

Rep. Allen circulates statement

Twenty legislators from the First Congressional District have signed a new segregation declaration urging a "massive fight" to resist any efforts to bring about token integration in Georgia.

The document, circulated among the lawmakers from the First District Monday by Representative Francis Allen of Statesboro and Bulloch County, is the first unified expression from legislators at the 1960 session in opposition to James S. Peters' letter saying school segregation is a lost cause.

Rep. Wiley Fordham, Bulloch's other representative, signed the declaration.

Among signers of the declaration was Rep. George L. Smith II of Swainsboro, the powerful speaker of the House.

"We believe with fervent conviction that the pressure groups in this state, and without this state, who are singing the song of token integration have no real interest in, or concern for, the welfare of the children of Georgia," the declaration states. "Furthermore, the phrase 'token integration' is no more than verbal hypocrisy inasmuch as once integration becomes a reality in one locality of Georgia it is simply a matter of time before it would happen in other areas of Georgia."

"We further stoutly believe that a massive fight must be made to resist the efforts of those who would degrade the health, welfare and morals of Georgia children by seeking to mix races in public schools," the lawmakers declared.

The document asked that the press and "others" would publicly demand that the handful of agitators, who are plaintiffs in the Atlanta school case, discontinue their suit and live in peace and harmony. It stated that this approach would be far better than "the fallacious insistence that all other citizens of Georgia knuckle under to the efforts of those of the Atlanta metropolitan area who would break down Georgia traditions."

The statement further declares that Georgians can find ways of continuing education of their children "within the framework of our constitution."

She is a teacher in the Mattie Lively Elementary School in Statesboro, and vice president of the Alpha Delta Kappa Chapter which is an International Teachers' Society, Secretary of American Association of University Women, a member of the First Methodist Church choir, as well as being secretary of the Statesboro Music Club.

When Mrs. Godbee came back five years ago to her native town to live, she joined the Statesboro BPW Club, and at once began to work for its objectives. The county voters, chosen and sworn to serve at the January 1960 Term of Bulloch Superior Court, had to submit the following recommendations and presentments:

1. We received an oral report from Edgar H. Wynn, chairman of the Bulloch County Board of Commissioners, who reported the County in good fiscal condition.

2. We received a lengthy report from H. P. Womack, County School Superintendent, showing in detail many of the operations of our County School System. We feel that this shows our schools to be in good physical condition, though many schools are still crowded. Much detail was given regarding the transportation system.

3. Miss Sarah Hall, Director of the Bulloch County Public Welfare Department, made her report which shows that much good work is being done by this Department.

4. We received, and attach hereto, report of the Study Committee headed by Hoke S. Brunson, chairman, regarding equalization for our county tax district. We most heartily approve this report and recommend that proper officials follow it through to completion.

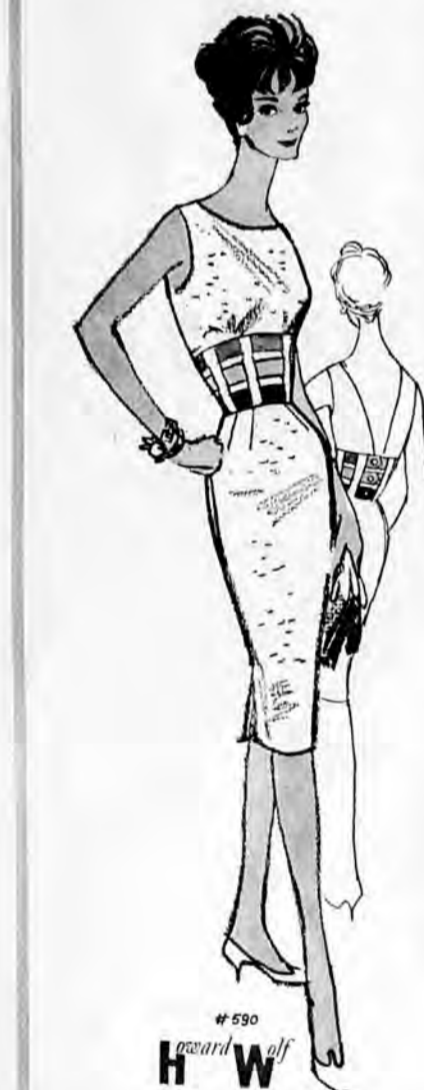

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DALE JENSEN, BAND DIRECTOR, SPEAKS TO STATESBORO MUSIC CLUB
