

The bill provides imprisonment for not less than ten days nor more than twelve months, or a fine of \$100, or both for the first conviction; imprisonment for not less than thirty days not more than twelve months, or a fine of ond conviction; imprisonment for not less than sixty days nor more than twelvee months, or a fine of \$300 to \$1,000, or both for the third conviction; imprisonment for not less than ninety days nor more than twelve months, and a fine of not more than \$1,000 for the fourth or subsequent convictions.
