Fertilizer injury caused by high concentration near plant roots

What is it?
 Fertilizer injury is caused by high concentrations of soluble fertilizer salts in the soil solution surrounding the young plant. It is high enough the plant can't take water from the soil.

What fertilizer salts cause fertilizer burn?
 Fertilizer salts differ greatly in their effect on the concentration of the soil solution. Since phosphate is slowly soluble and moves very slowly from point of placement, it seldom causes an oven and dries out.

Potash and nitrogen, on the other hand, are water soluble and move readily in the soil. Since nitrate nitrogen is not attached to the soil particles, it is available readily than ammoniac nitrogen. Potash and nitrogen in a fertilizer are the two fertilizer salts that generally cause fertilizer injury.

Soil movement is largely in a vertical direction. For a given set of weather conditions, the extent of water movement up and down is influenced by soil texture. Greater up and down movement of fertilizer salts exist in a sandy-type soil than in a heavier clay-type soil. Therefore, the same concentration of fertilizer salts under the same weather conditions will be more likely cause "fertilizer injury" in a sandy-type soil than on a clay-type soil.

As soil dries out, concentration of the soil solution is increased, soil water moves upward by capillary movement, and the fertilizer salts (nitrogen and potash) move with it. In some instances they may be deposited on the surface just above the fertilizer band, which may be seen as a white deposit. Rain immediately after planting followed by a long dry period is conducive to upward movement. With considerable rain the soluble salts tend to move downward again.

In the past Georgia farmers have used fertilizers low in nitrogen and potash, such as 8-8-6 and 4-8-6, and at relatively low per acre rates. Placements of fertilizer were not then too important. However, with the increased use of high analysis fertilizer such 5-10-15 and 4-12-12, and with higher per acre rates, fertilizer placement is of critical importance to Georgia farmers.

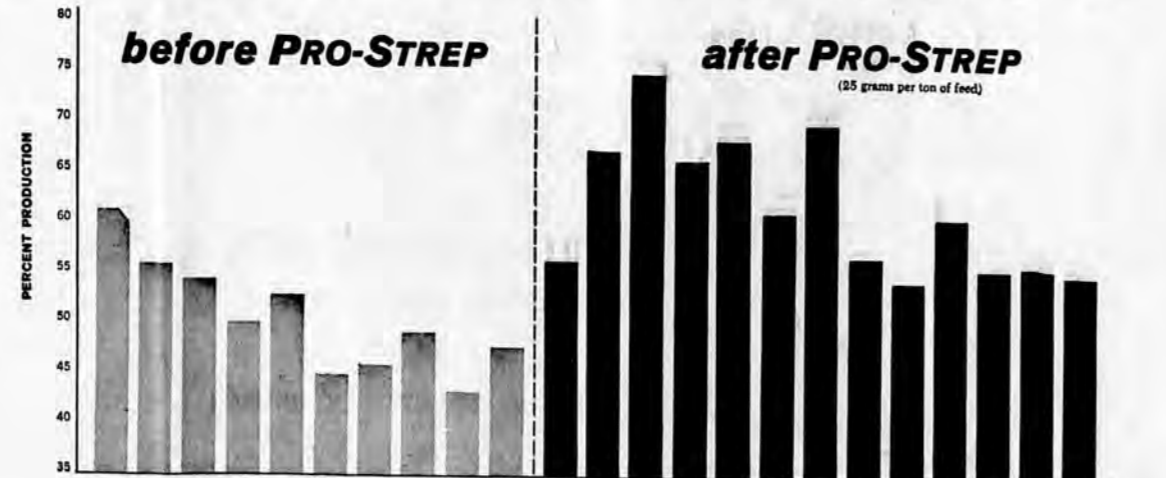
