





Happy Anniversary

On May 11, 1935 twenty-five years ago, the then president of the United States, Franklin D. Roosevelt, signed a presidential order which marked the beginning of a revolution in the social and economics wellbeing of the rural areas of this great nation.

For it was on that date that Executive Order No. 7037, signed by President Roosevelt, established the Rural Electrification Administration, which has come to be known simply as "REA".

On the observance of REA's Twenty-Fifth Anniversary last week, locally owned and managed rural electric systems added up more than one and four-tenths million miles of electric distribution lines, serving more than sixteen million people, on more than ninety-six per cent of the nation's farms.

The impact of electrification of American farms is tremendous.

There are many children today to whom the kerosene lamp, the sadirons, ice boxes, pump handles, have no meaning.

It was rural electrification which brought new meaning to living in rural homes. Bringing electricity to the farm marked the beginning of the end of darkness and backwardness on the

Use of electricity on the farm exceeds the wildest dreams of 1935 when the REA was born. Today there are more than 450 different applications of electricity on the farm and in the farm
