WALKS OF THE CITY OF STATESBORO BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of Statesboro, and it is hereby ordained by virtue of the auth-ority of same that from and after the passage of this ordin-ance it shall be unlawful for any person to operate on the streets or sidewalks of said city any form of gasoline powered vehy cle, commonly called "Go-Carts" or any other such vehicle having such shape and dimensions, pow-ier and other characteristics of the go-cart type of vehicle, the same being described in a gener-al way as having a flat platform for a body with no hood or fenders and powered by one or more small air cooled gasoline motors. In the opinion of the City Council of Statesboro, said vehi-cles are tangerous to the opera-tor and to other traffic of the reason that they are small and fast and cannot be easily scen by other conventional type vehi-cles and are a traffic hazard and produce unnecessary noise. Any person violating this ordi-nance will, upon conviction in the Recorder's Court of this City, be fined not to exceed \$200.00 or imprisoned not to exceed thirty days in the city jall, either or both.
