**So the summit meeting blew up**

The "summit" meeting blew up. For a few hours peoples all over the world felt it was a touch and go situation. Now, most think we have a breathing spell. Maybe so. We can only join the peoples of the nations in prayerful hope. So now comes the painful period of self re-evaluation, to borrow a phrase from the diplomats and the politicians. Politicians are now rushing in to print to place the blame. The Democrats want the people to believe that the Republicans are to blame. The Republicans want us to know that it was not their fault. But the real reasons for our predicament are more basic than that. Can it not be traced all the way back to our preoccupation with things material? To our concern with the business of making as much money as we can in as short a time as we can? To the gradual deterioration of our moral fiber as manifested in our mounting crime incidence. To our casual acceptance of government by bureaucracy? To the growing philosophy of our college youth which focus attention on the dol-

lar value of their education? To our increasing acquiescence to the continuing demands of our military establishment without examining their validity? And on and on. Of course it's not that simple. It goes deep into our inner being... the inner being of the individual. There must be a stiffening of our spirit. There must be a toughening of our moral fiber. We are a young nation, historically viewed. But already we are heading down the road followed by the Romans which lead to their total destruction. Our great churches are warning us and have been warning us that if we are to survive and maintain our status as the world's greatest nation, we must bring ourselves up to a short stop, reverse our way of life and turn to Him in whom our hope for survival rests. Their warning is on firm foundation. And unless heeded — then there'll be Hell upon earth, and it'll be by our own hand. Then, there'll be no need for "summits."

**Now is the time**

Remember just five brief years ago how you were cheered by the announcement: "The Salk polio vaccine is safe, effective and potent." And you hastened to your doctor's office, screaming for vaccine for your children. And then a tragedy of defective lots of the vaccine dampened your enthusiasm, though just for a time. That was five years ago. Now polio threatens again. Last year it paralyzed 5,000 victims, as many as it had struck down in some of the years before the vaccine. And the worse may lay ahead this summer. Why? A principal reason is that millions of children and adults have never been vaccinated. Forty-nine per cent of the American population has had no vaccine at all. And it will be among these forty-nine percent that paralytic polio will take its heaviest toll this summer. The Salk vaccine is proving as effective as was predicted to be in 1955. If you have not had your children vaccinated, are you not guilty of gross neglect to the health and safety of your loved ones? Think on this and if you have not provided this protection for your children, there is no better time than NOW!

**AA helps those who come seeking help**

FOR A HEAVY drinker to decide that he is an alcoholic, is an awesome decision. As was pointed out last week, it involves only two choices: (1) Give up the dearest thing in life, alcohol, or (2) Wait for the consequences. The reason for this is that a drinker will usually postpone the decision and continue drinking. This is a progressive, not always slow, form of suicide. The family, friends, and associates see this long before the alcoholic himself. When their efforts to help are rejected they turn to the physician or minister. These men, too, with earnestness tell him to stop drinking. And he resists them because he wonders if he had not rather die than give up alcohol, a state of mind he may not admit even to himself. With thought processes like this involved, it is clear that alcoholism is a disease of the mind and soul as well as of the body, and thus not benefited by appeals based on moral responsibility or conscience. What, then, can be done? For the family, the answer is to watch while the alcoholic drinks himself into such a deplorable condition that he finally sees himself truly but loses everything in the process? This may be necessary. Fortunately, not always. Before going further, let us ask another question. Why does the alcoholic, faced with the important decision described and unable to make a choice himself, reject help from those who love him? The total answer to this could be quite complicated. In general, it lies in the one word, **ADVICE**. Everybody gives him advice, tells him what he should do, says he shouldn't drink if he could see what is happening to him and his family. They tell him to stop drinking. They say he can stop to church. They say he can stop drinking if he will only use enough will power.

**The Alcoholic returns**

THE ALCOHOLIC returns to a totally different setting. When persons or families are looking for a church home, they should consider the personalities of the several congregations in question. They should make their decision based on certain considerations. DO I FEEL AT EASE in this worshipping group? Have I given the people an opportunity to be friendly to me? (This is the proper question rather than, "Are these people friendly?") Can I make a contribution in Christian service in this situation? Finally, but not the least important, is this the place where God wants me and my family? Taking seriously the task of rightly choosing a church home can avert spiritual disaster. I think most pastors and congregations sincerely want individuals and families to attend the church of their choice. Of course, we have our own good reasons why we think our church is the right choice. But, over and above our own feelings of denominational pride, there is the overwhelming certainty that choosing a church home is the individual's or the family's responsibility. We should choose a church home prayerfully, carefully, and intelligently making us forth in spiritual happiness and usefulness in the Kingdom of God.

## Farm and Family Features

### Pastures graded in five classifications

By Roy Powell, County Agent

**PASTURE GRADES**

We talk about excellent, good or poor quality pasture. But just what do these grades of pasture mean? The USDA and Extension Service use five grades to classify pasture. These grades are excellent, good, fair, poor, and scanty.

In North Georgia cotton is ready for control of thrips. Two light applications of sprays or dusts 7-day intervals are recommended. These should be applied as soon as the cotton is up to stand. Control of thrips helps cotton to grow faster and begin fruiting earlier.

For more complete details on controlling cotton insects ask your county agent for revised Circular 372, "Cotton Insect Control."

**EGG SWEATING**

Now that hot weather is here, the sweating of eggs becomes a more serious problem. Moisture on eggs increases opportunity for bacteria to get in the egg and for the eggs to collect dirt. Sweating is determined mostly by the dew point, which is the temperature at which moisture in the air condenses out of water. When the temperature of an egg is below the dew point of air surrounding it, moisture condenses on the egg.

Sweating usually takes place when eggs are removed from refrigerated rooms for transportation or for grading and packing. The use of air conditioners in the grading and packing room will aid in reducing the rate of sweating. In this way differences in temperature between the refrigerated box and the grading and packing room is reduced. In the same manner, the use of refrigerated trucks in picking up and delivering eggs lessens rate of sweating.

"Good" pasture is not as abundant as excellent pasture. Forage varieties or soil fertility may limit the growth. But the pasture does furnish considerable grazing, and cows are always getting a full supply. From 50 to 80 percent of the grasses should have a good green color, with 80 percent or more of the land covered. Most supplementary grazing crops provide good grade pasture.

"Fair" quality pasture is usually one that was previously excellent or good, but which has been heavily grazed or is in the latter half of the grazing season. Pasture that makes slow growth but contains few weeds except in low places are in this category. Fair grade pasture also includes supplementary grazing plants past the succulent stage.

"Poor" pastures are those making some growth, but which are weedy. Pasture that is in a dry season becomes dry and tough also is classed here.

A "scanty" pasture is generally one where the forage is dry and short, over-grazed, weedy, and on low fertility soil. Pastures that afford no or little grazing except in low places are in this class.

### Your Opportunities In industry as a technician

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This is one of a series of articles prepared by Dr. Donald F. Hackett, professor and head of the Industrial Education Department of Georgia Southern College, designed to inform young people of the opportunities as technicians. It is an adaptation and a quotation, in part, from a National Association of Manufacturers publication "Your Opportunities in Industry as a Technician."

Less than a lifetime ago the Wright brothers made the first successful flight at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, and "aerodynamics" was a word still to be added to the dictionary. The Wrights' historic, but brief excursion covered a distance about equal to the wing span of a modern heavy bomber!

Air transportation today is one of the most important influences in our daily lives, and almost thirty million people a year take to the air to travel fast, comfortably and safely.

Aircraft manufacturing, (the nation's largest field of manufacturing employment) research and development are loaded with opportunity and challenge for technicians — as tool designers, technical writers, electronics specialists, draftsmen, engineering sales representatives. In fact, at least 138 different classifications of technicians are needed to build a modern jet fighter!

There are thousands of complex steps and procedures that must be followed in the design and manufacture of aircraft. Experimental rocket planes that now fly several times the speed of sound required from eight to ten years to pass through the design, fabrication and test stages. During the construction of the F-84 jet, 315 engineering changes a week were made in its design!

Performance of rockets and missiles never ceases and the technician is generally right in the middle of this development working on flight test evaluation, weight control, stress analysis, and helping engineers on experimental laboratory projects.

One rocket specialist estimates that by 1966, much of the nation's air freight may be traveling by automatically controlled, guided missiles. By 1971, a one way trip to the moon should require only 15 hours. The first full sized space vehicle might be about 100 feet long and will probably be powered by rocket engines. 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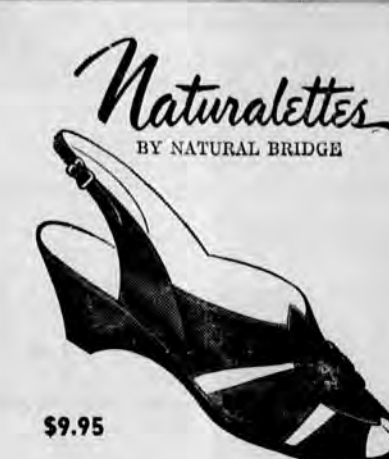

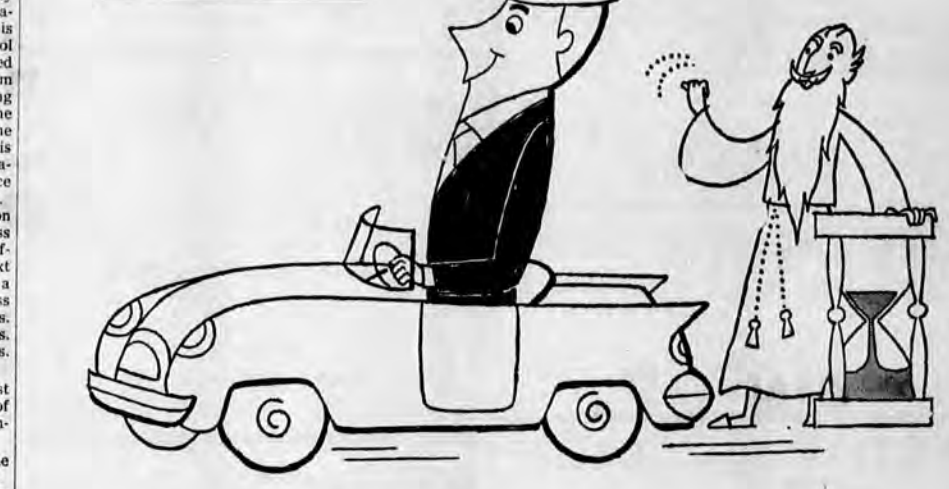

**AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE OPERATION OF "GO-CART" TYPE VEHICLES ON THE STREETS AND SIDEWALKS OF THE CITY OF STATESBORO**

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of Statesboro, and it is hereby ordained by virtue of the authority of same that from and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person to operate on the streets or sidewalks of said city any form of gasoline powered vehicle, commonly called "Go-Carts" or any other such vehicle having such shape and dimensions, power and other characteristics of the go-cart type of vehicle, the same being described in a general way as having a flat platform for a body with no hood or fenders and powered by one or more small air cooled gasoline motors. In the opinion of the City Council of Statesboro, said vehicles are dangerous to the operator and to other traffic of the reason that they are small and fast and cannot be easily seen by other conventional type vehicles and are a traffic hazard and produce unnecessary noise.

Any person violating this ordinance will, upon conviction in the Recorder's Court of this City, be fined not to exceed \$200.00 or imprisoned not to exceed thirty days in the city jail, either or both.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
