



Editorials

The 'blue tag' tobacco law plays havoc here

Opening day on the Statesboro tobacco market saw a lot of unhappy tobacco growers.

The 1960 season opened with the floors of the thirteen big wareuses here less than half full in contrast to previous years when the first day sales rose to as high as 825,110 pounds.

And it all came about because of the Georgia law which specifies that tobacco grown by out-ofstate growers, north of the Savannah River, should be identified by a blue sale tag and that tobacco grown by Georgia and Florida growers be identified by a white sale tag.

The opening day sales reacted swiftly to this new requirement. The buyers gave the blue tagged tobacco the "cold shoulder." The situation did not improve on the second day sales.

By this time the warehouseme on the Statesboro market and farmers in this section and South Carolina were hot as a fire pop-

Congressman Preston followed the sales on Friday to get a picture of what was happening. Tiny Hill, president of the Statesboro and Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce, called a special meeting of the Chamber's board of directors and they pledged the support and strength of the business group.

Statesboro, too, is in the first district

S. 301, with our superb motels and restaurants; our clean and modern usiness section, our big industry, Rockwell Manufacturing Company; and our smaller industries. arydell Styles, A. M. Braswell Jr. Food Products, Robbins Packing Company, the Gold Kist Pea nut plant; our new sewerage disposal plant, our city improvement plans, our county tax re-evalua tion program-and more.

And on Saturday warehouse men, in cooperation with Swainsboro warehousemen, took swift and specific action. They asked U. S. District Court Judge Frank M. Scarlett to sign a temporary injunction preventing the Georgia commissioner of agriculture from enforcing the state's tobacco identification law. Judge Scarlet signed the injunction and it was served on Commissioner Phil Campbell. A three-judge federal panel will be named to hear the

The word got around fast. And on Monday morning of this week the Statesboro market moved back to about normal. There were no blue sale tags showing . . . just

a plain white tag on all tobacco. But we cannot rest. The state is seeking a speedy hearing on the injunction

If the tag identification law is allowed to remain on the statue books of Georgia the reprecussion in Statesboro will be severe. It is already predicted that the Statesboro market, the largest in the state, will be reduced to a oneset-of-buyers market. Merchants, restaurants, motels, service stations, and the over-all economy of this county would be hurt.

We commend the county leaders for their swift and postive action in this economic emergency

power. And its power which bids no good for the rank and file worker who believes in the rights of the individual and the freedom of free


expression. It's a bid for power which would be invested in those leaders who have brought the labor movement under the scrutinty of our Congressional investigation committees.
