Bids to build 301 Welcome Station set for October 4

With the advertising for bids by the State Department of Commerce the Tourist Information & Welcome Station becomes a certain added facility for the tourists who enter Georgia on U. S. 301 from the east.

The Station will be west of the Burton ferry station on Route 301 and about one mile from the Savannah River. The station will be located on a tract of land donated by Mr. Rowan.

The Welcome Station will be the first of its kind erected in Georgia and our information is that it will be of modern construction and design. The station will have a spacious lobby rest rooms, and an information bureau conducted by trained personnel. The outside area will be shaded with trees and will have picnic shelters for the convenience of travelers. Georgia has long needed such a station on U. S. 301. The thousands of tourists who travel 301 going to Florida have needed a place where the state could receive its guests and extend the glad hand of welcome to them. The station will do much to contrast with the old station which the state has received in the past.

A group of seven county citizens have been working for months on this project and they are to be congratulated upon the final approval of it by the State of Georgia. Since it is the first station to be erected such officials had no precedent to guide them. It was necessary for the local committee to make many requests to the state legal technicians after another was complied with. Final approval by the State of the location, construction and appropriation for the station, leaves the formal letting of the contract the last act necessary.

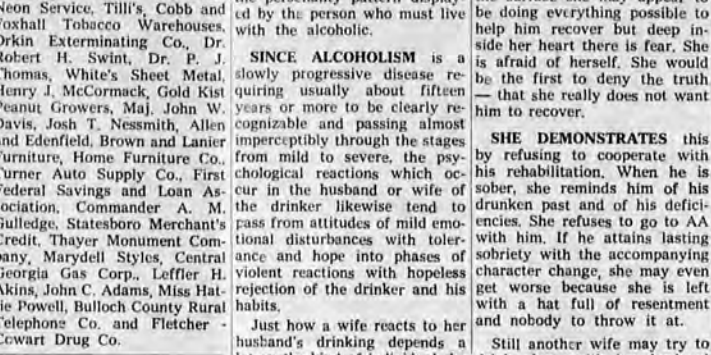
C of C steps-up membership drive this week

How our government spends 46 billion dollars for defense

A VERY INTERESTING article in the September 5th issue of the U. S. News & World Report gives us an insight as to where and how our Government is spending our 46 billion dollars which Congress has approved for defense.

There aren't many of us who can grasp the meaning of this much money. Certainly 46 billion dollars has little if any meaning to me in terms of just how much money is involved. A quick look at the defense spending however should be of tremendous interest to all of us for we can all understand that a lion's share of our tax money is being earmarked for defense.

ACTUAL SPENDING for defense, which includes funds for atomic energy, aid to our allies and our space programs is about 600 million from last year and now totals a whopping 46 billion dollars. (Bear in mind that ten hundred million equals one billion.)

New naval vessels, missiles, planes and other military equipment accounts for a little more than 15 billion of the total bill. Some 4.6 billion is earmarked for new research and development contracts and new military construction calls for 1.3 billion dollars.

Pay and allowances for our military personnel costs some thing over 12 billion dollars, and operations and maintenance gets another 10.5 billions, with atomic energy programs calling for 2.7 billions.

ADD TO THESE figures the 10 billion for defense plant expansion 1.7 billion for military aid to our allies and 600 million for our space programs and we find the total close to the 46 billion which is budgeted. A few other millions here and there round out the total picture.

This is reason enough for Jesus to direct his heaviest artillery against pride. It is the only sin toward which he showed no mercy. To those filled with this sin of the spirit he warned: "Ye are like unto whitewashed sepulchers..." how can ye escape the damnation of hell? It is not easy to unmask the sin of pride. Jesus did so, however, by telling a story about a Pharisee and a publican which is found in Luke 18:10-14.

The Master's intention in this story was to bring this radical sin to light by contrasting two exaggerated types of people. The main interest of the parable is focused on the Pharisee. His motive is to expose the evil character of spiritual pride.

Peanut civil penalty is explained

Any civil penalty imposed on a peanut grower because of false identifications of peanuts or failure to account for the disposition of peanuts produced on his farm is in addition to the penalty for actual marketings of excess peanuts, Chairman V. J. Rowe of the Bulloch Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee announced today.

As an example of this situation, Mr. Rowe cited the case of a farm operator who uses an excess peanut marketing card to market a portion of his crop and in connection with such marketings pays penalties of \$100. It is later determined that this farm operator did not properly use his excess marketing card to identify his entire crop and that a portion of his crop was actually marketed by using within-quota cards issued for other farms.

The farm operator would then be subject to a civil penalty equal to his normal yield times his excess acreage times the basic penalty rate. The penalty so computed would be in addition to the \$100 already paid.

Recommendations made for grazing

By ROY POWELL

Fall and winter can be a time of scarce grazing, but the following recommendations have proven successful for many farmers throughout the state in providing plenty of good grazing.

FUTURE DEMAND FOR WOOD

Georgia's various wood industries offer forest owners diverse and profitable markets for their products. The development of these industries depends upon the development of our timber resources.

Economists predict that within the next 20 years our sawtimber requirements will increase by 30 percent, pulpwood by 130 percent, and other forest products by 50 percent. To meet these increased demands, we must begin now to bring our timber lands to full production.

The latest U. S. Forest Service survey shows that our present timber land acreage is producing at less than half its capacity.

Small land owners should begin to apply Georgia's six step program of (1) Prevention and control of fires, (2) reforestation if idle land, (3) timber stand improvement, (4) diversified utilization, (5) good harvesting practices, and (6) wise selling.

By meeting the demands for timber, we can double our income from forestry. Further information on forest management can be obtained at your county agent's office.

CHEAP OATS SEED

Many Georgia farmers each year are losing money by buying cheap, feed oats and planting this for their crop. To insure a good crop you should buy a seed of an adapted variety. Saving a little money on seed and getting a poor crop as a result is being penny wise and pound foolish.

Buy seed which has been treated to control seed-borne diseases. Low quality seed often contain objectionable and noxious weed seed.

To know what you are getting when buying seed, learn to be a seed tag reader. Buy a good variety with germination of 80 percent or above and a purity of 98 percent or above.

Labor Supporting Hagan, AFL-CIO Official Declares

Georgia's organized labor is supporting Elliott Hagan in his bid to unseat First District Rep. Prince Preston, an official said in Atlanta Wednesday, (August 24).

W. M. Crim, secretary of the state AFL-CIO Council, which represents 250 locals, said the council's Committee on Political Education (COPE) is supporting Hagan, George Bagby in the Seventh District, and F. Quill Sammon in the Ninth District. Bagby is running for the seat to be vacated by Rev. Erwin Mitchell and Sammon is running against Rep. Phil Landrum, co-author of the labor act passed by Congress.

Sammon said Wednesday that neither he nor his campaign treasurer has personally received money from Hoffa. Sammon said, was made to Sammon supporters.

In Statesboro, Rep. Preston said COPE is "labor's strongest weapon in its effort to unseat members of Congress who support the Landrum-Griffin bill."

He has accused Hagan of receiving large sums of money from the Teamsters Union, the Electrical Workers Union, and other labor groups. Teamster president Jimmy Hoffa said Tuesday he contributed \$1,000 to the Sammon campaign fund. Tuesday night, Sam Portwine, public relations officer for the Teamsters, said the union has made "no contribution" to the Hagan campaign.

"He carefully avoids saying whether Teamster Union funds are being spent by others in the First District," Preston said in commenting on Portwine's statement.

Preston, who said he "wouldn't believe Portwine on his oath" charged "it is perfectly obvious that the large sums being expended in support of my opponent are not coming from the First District."

Hagan has denied he has received financial aid from the Teamsters and Electrical Workers Unions.

The Teamsters are not affiliated with the AFL-CIO, but the Electrical Workers are.

Labor Supporting Hagan, AFL-CIO Official Declares

Georgia's organized labor is supporting Elliott Hagan in his bid to unseat First District Rep. Prince Preston, an official said in Atlanta Wednesday, (August 24).

W. M. Crim, secretary of the state AFL-CIO Council, which represents 250 locals, said the council's Committee on Political Education (COPE) is supporting Hagan, George Bagby in the Seventh District, and F. Quill Sammon in the Ninth District. Bagby is running for the seat to be vacated by Rev. Erwin Mitchell and Sammon is running against Rep. Phil Landrum, co-author of the labor act passed by Congress.

Sammon said Wednesday that neither he nor his campaign treasurer has personally received money from Hoffa. Sammon said, was made to Sammon supporters.

In Statesboro, Rep. Preston said COPE is "labor's strongest weapon in its effort to unseat members of Congress who support the Landrum-Griffin bill."

He has accused Hagan of receiving large sums of money from the Teamsters Union, the Electrical Workers Union, and other labor groups. Teamster president Jimmy Hoffa said Tuesday he contributed \$1,000 to the Sammon campaign fund. Tuesday night, Sam Portwine, public relations officer for the Teamsters, said the union has made "no contribution" to the Hagan campaign.

"He carefully avoids saying whether Teamster Union funds are being spent by others in the First District," Preston said in commenting on Portwine's statement.

Preston, who said he "wouldn't believe Portwine on his oath" charged "it is perfectly obvious that the large sums being expended in support of my opponent are not coming from the First District."

Hagan has denied he has received financial aid from the Teamsters and Electrical Workers Unions.

The Teamsters are not affiliated with the AFL-CIO, but the Electrical Workers are.
