Rockwell's annual payroll approximately \$1,000,000

On Monday evening, January 23, 1956, Thad J. Morris, president of the Bulloch County Development Corporation, presented the keys of a fine building to Mr. W. F. Rockwell Jr., president of the Rockwell Manufacturing Company and the Rockwell Statesboro Corporation became a part of Statesboro and Bulloch County.

On February 1, 1956 the first person was employed at the plant located on U.S. 301, North. On December 31 of that year the number on the payroll was 252. On January 22, 1957 it had grown to 285 and has stabilized at about that figure. The annual payroll is approximately one million dollars.

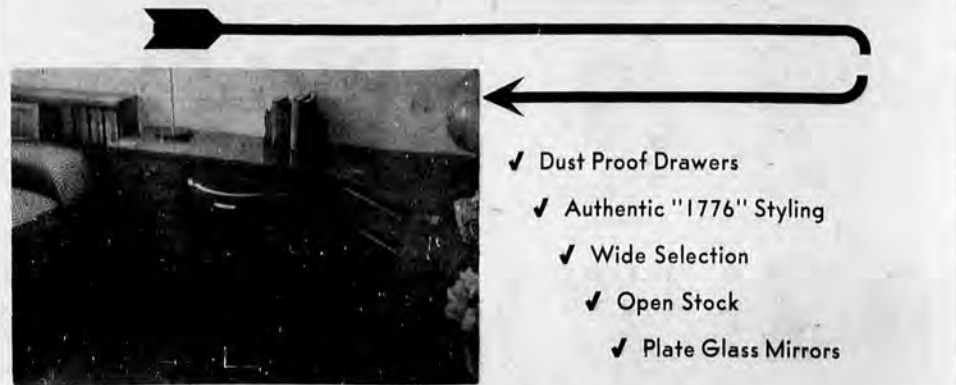
