Progress Abounds On GSC Campus

Construction recently completed, now underway, and planned for the future, should enable GSC to accommodate a student body of 1800, according to President Zach S. Henderson. Enrollment is now 1,262. Dr. Henderson stated that the new girls' dormitory, which is now under construction, will house 160 girls. He said that the \$500,000 building is expected to be completed by the 1960-61 winter quarter. Another half-million dollar project to be completed by the winter quarter is the industrial arts building. The president said that this building will be composed of fully equipped shops offering courses in electronics, woodworking, mechanical drawing, sheet metal working and others. A third building now under construction is the Home Management House located behind the student center. This building will provide girls with practical experience in managing a home. He said that a capacity of eight girls will live in the house for a quarter, doing their own cooking, sewing and washing. He

added that this \$55,000 building is expected to be in use during the winter quarter. Dr. Henderson went on to describe other improvements made during the summer which include the addition of a fully equipped language laboratory on the ground floor of the Administration Building and complete remodeling of the second floor. Dr. Henderson went on to say that Come and Lewis Hall were repainted during the summer and the West wing of the second floor of Deal dormitory was remodeled.

Commenting on proposed construction and expansion in the future, Dr. Henderson said that proposals have been brought forward to build two more dormitories, one girls' and one boys', plus additions to Lewis Hall, the library and the Haner Building.

Charlie Nessmith is named 'Man of Year' for Soil work

In special ceremonies held at the Community House in Metter on Thursday night, October 20, Mr. Charlie Nessmith was named Bulloch County's "Man of the Year in Soil Conservation" for 1960.

Agriculture Phil Campbell was the guest speaker at the ceremony. This was the tenth annual awarding of the honor. It is sponsored by the bankers and soil supervisors of the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District.

Bulloch County's "Man of the Year in Soil Conservation" for 1960 is a real dirt farmer. He has farmed all his life and would be completely lost in any other line of work. He started farming in 1938 the year after he married. He farmed for two years standing rent before buying his own place. In 1940 he purchased the old Dan Akins place in the Portia Community which consisted of about 100 acres. The land itself was good, but there were no improvements. There were no houses, barns, or fences of much value.

With the financial assistance of the old Farm Security Administration, now known as the Farmers Home Administration, Mr. Nessmith was able not only to buy the farm, but build a new home for his family. He began immediately to build barns and fences. He now has a large barn for livestock and feed storage, a modern implement shed, and completely new-fencing over the entire place. He also has a fine 4" deep well for home and livestock use.

In 1946 Bulloch's "Man of the Year" bought an adjoining farm of 98 acres known as the Pleasant Akins place, and it was at this point that he began his Soil and Water Conservation program. He first had a completed Soil and Water Conservation plan made for his entire farm of 198 acres. The plan called for terraces with sodded waterways, a farm pond, pastures of coastal bermuda grass, and conservation crop rotations. In addition to proper woodland management.

Mr. Nessmith immediately began applying the plan to the land. Most of his 130 acres of cropland was good Tifton soil which was washing badly. He completely terraced all this land with conventional terraces. He planted 12 acres of coastal bermuda pasture and constructed a farm pond for livestock and fish. He planted two acres of Arlington Strain Sericea Lespedeza furnished by the Soil Conservation Service for trial and observation.

Rainfall of the week was .51 inches.

Then came parallel terraces which reduce the cost of all farming operations, and our man again requested assistance from the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District to do this work. The Soil Conservation Service staked the terraces and waterways out and the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District, operating a motor grader, leveled out the old terraces with 5 shaped and sodded waterways have been built in the past three years through this teamwork. These five waterways have been seeded to pensacola bahia grass. In addition to all this work, he completely rebuilt and deepened his old farm pond this year. And, in tune with the times, he tried his first match planted soybeans this year - about 20 acres and built new parallel terraces - a total of 6.3 miles of parallel terraces with 5 shaped and sodded waterways and enlarged the original home.

Bulloch County's "Man of the Year in Soil Conservation" for 1960, Charlie Nessmith, is a good farmer, a fine sportsman, and a loyal friend. He is married to the former Miss Blanche Akins and has one son - Charles Ricky. He takes an active part in community and church affairs, and is a good neighbor to all who know him. When asked what he attributed most of his farming success to, he immediately gave credit to his fine wife, Blanche. He then added that the financial help of the FHA, the Production Credit Association, and the Banks helped make it all possible. To the Soil Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service he attributed most of his better farming methods and the stability of his farming enterprise.

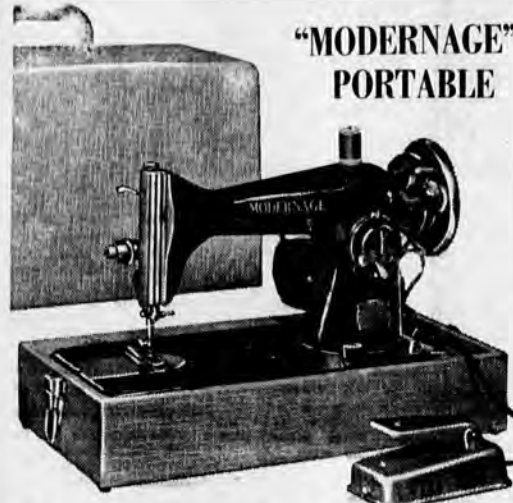

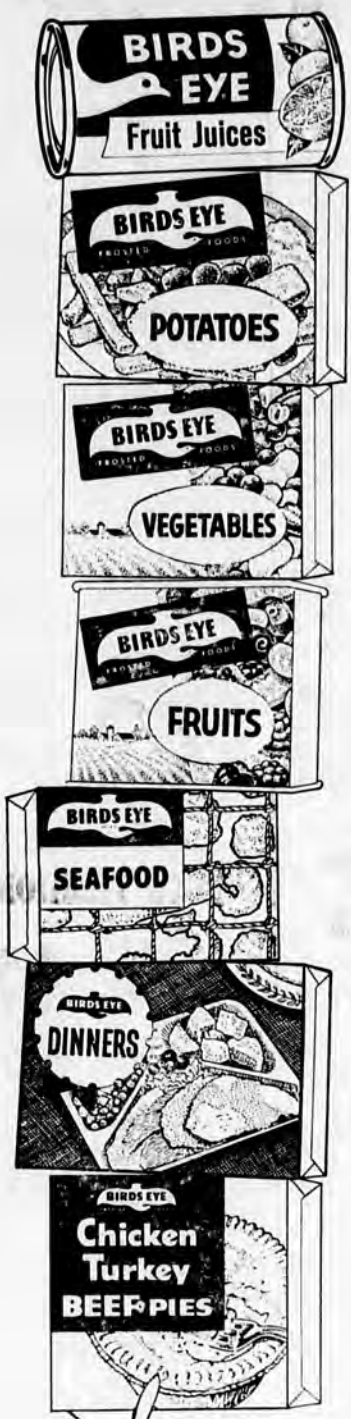

Title: For or Against "ratification of amendment to the Constitution so as to authorize counties to purchase liability insurance."

#3. ADDITIONAL MEMBERS TO STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Title: For or Against "ratification of amendment to the Constitution so as to provide for additional members to the State Board of Education."

Explanation: This would amend Art. VIII, Sec. II, Par. 1, which provides for additional members to the State Board of Education.

#2. ADDITIONAL MEMBERS TO STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Title: For or Against "ratification of amendment to the Constitution so as to provide for additional members to the State Board of Education."

Explanation: This would amend Art. VIII, Sec. II, Par. 1, which provides for additional members to the State Board of Education.

#1. "COMPROMISE" HIGHWAY AMENDMENT

Title: For or Against "ratification of an amendment to the Constitution to provide for the appropriation of motor fuel taxes for highway construction and maintenance purposes in order to provide an adequate system of through highways, rural and post roads and bridges in this State."

Explanation: This would amend Art. VII, Sec. LX, Par. IV, which provides for the appropriation of motor fuel taxes for highway construction and maintenance purposes.

#4. AID TO LARGE CITIES

Title: For or Against "ratification of amendment to the Constitution so as to provide for aid to large cities."

Explanation: This would amend Art. VII, Sec. II, to add paragraph 1D, which provides for aid to large cities.

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Explanation: This would amend Art. VII, Sec. VI, Par. 1 (a), which provides for payment of contract obligations authorized by the State Constitution.

On the General Election ballot, November 8 there will be 19 proposed amendments of state-wide application and 68 amendments of local application. The 19 state-wide amendments must receive a majority of the total state vote to be adopted. Local amendments will be voted on only in the areas where they apply and must receive a majority vote. Remember: each vote counts equally in the General Election. The County Unit system does not apply.

Loan Program Applications Are Available Here

Georgia Southern College is one of many institutions of higher learning participating in the National Defense Student Loan Program.

The program is one of the provisions of the National Defense Education Act enacted in law in 1958 to enable scholastically able students in need of financial aid to go to college.

Requirements Listed

The eligibility requirements and provisions of the program are as follows:
1. Student loans available under provisions of this act are for persons regularly enrolled or admitted as full-time students. Beginning freshmen or transfer student will receive consideration when they have been properly admitted by the Registrar for full-time study.

2. The deadline for an application for any given quarter is thirty (30) days prior to the date of registration for that quarter. Applications may be filed on a yearly basis. Summer school is considered separate from the regular academic year.

3. Preference is given to students who are planning to teach in the elementary or secondary public schools or who will study in the fields of science, mathematics, foreign language, or engineering. However, consideration is given to all other categories of able, needy students.

4. Loans are awarded for students evidencing scholastic aptitude who cannot come to college without financial aid or who cannot stay enrolled in college without some financial assistance.

5. The college, acting through a President's Committee, must analyze carefully the financial need of the applicant and determine ways in which this need is actually needed. This is a statement of the financial resources of the student and parent or guardian is required.

6. Proper releases are required under Georgia law for applicants under 21 years of age.

7. Payment of the loan begins one year after the student graduates or leaves school.

8. Repayment of the loan begins one year after the termination of full-time study.

9. For students who enter public elementary or secondary school teaching, half of all they have borrowed is forgiven or put in another way is converted retroactively into a scholarship. This conversion takes place at the rate of 10% of the total loan and interest per year of teaching, for a maximum period of five years.

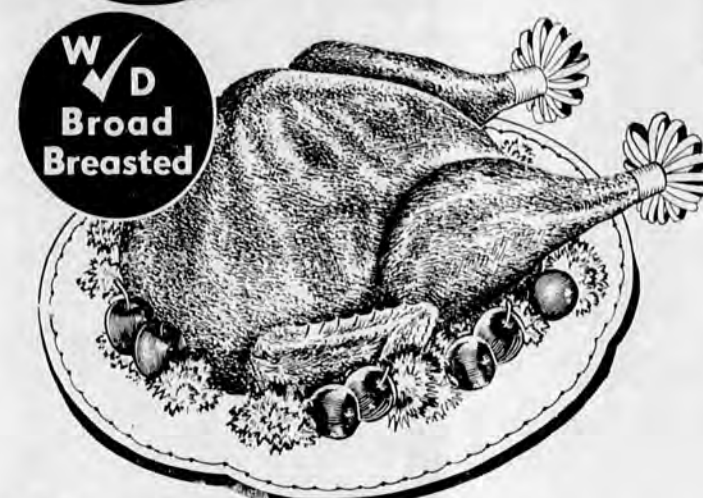

Constitutional Amendments

CONSTITUTION AMENDMENT NO. 13
Resolution Act No. 150
A RESOLUTION
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution so as to provide for repayment of medical loans and scholarships by service at Milledgeville State Hospital; to provide for the submission of this amendment for ratification or rejection; and for other purposes.

SECTION 1
Article VII, Section I, Paragraph II of the Constitution, as amended by an amendment ratified at the general election in 1952 and found in Georgia Laws 1951, Page 861, is hereby amended by striking from the eighth paragraph of that portion of Paragraph II added by the 1951 amendment the following: "One-fifth of the loan or scholarship, together with interest thereon, to be credited to the applicant for each year of practicing his profession in a community of 5000 population or less, according to 1950 or any future census, or at Milledgeville State Hospital, and no annual interest on the scholarship loan shall be paid during such practice or service."

Statesboro postal receipts up from \$69,000 to \$1200,000 in 6 years

A new all-time high in the nation's mail volume was reached during fiscal year 1960 ending June 30, which continued the steady upward trend of the past seven years at a rate which even exceeded the population growth, according to advance information from the Annual Report of the Post Office Department which has been made available to Postmaster Dennis R. DeLoach.

Although subject to last minute revisions, the year's total has been estimated as 83.6 billion pieces of mail which includes about one billion pieces of parcel post. It was stated that this volume means an increase of nearly 25 per cent over the corresponding figures of 1953 when the annual volume was 59.9 billion pieces.

During this same period, it was pointed out, the revenue of the Department also has shown an impressive gain with an increase from \$2,091,714,000 in fiscal year 1953 to \$3,276,800,000 for fiscal year 1960.

GSC named one of teacher testing centers

The National Teacher Examinations, prepared and administered annually by Educational Testing Service, will be given at 160 testing centers throughout the United States on Saturday, February 11, 1961. Georgia Southern College has been designated as one of these centers.

At the one-day testing session a candidate may take the Common Examinations, which include tests in Professional Information, General Culture, English Expressions, and Non-Verbal Reasoning; and one or two of 13 options designed to demonstrate mastery of subject matter to be taught. The college which a candidate is attending, or the school system in which he is seeking employment, will advise him whether he should take the National Teacher Examinations, and which of the optional examinations to select.

A bulletin of information and application may be obtained from Dr. Ralph K. Tyson, director of testing, Georgia Southern College, Statesboro, or directly from the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, 20 Nassau Street, Princeton, New Jersey.

We practice good forestry to help trees grow. Through better management we can grow more trees of high quality and high value. Let's examine a tree and see just how it grows and why this must be considered in forest management.

A tree is composed of three main parts - the root, the trunk and the crown. There are two kinds of roots, the tap root and the feeder roots. The tap root holds the tree in the ground and the feeder roots absorb moisture and minerals from the soil. The tap roots absorb a small amount of moisture and minerals and this is very helpful to the tree in dry seasons when the top of the ground is dry.

The trunk has five main parts and they are the outer bark, the inner bark which carries the food from the leaves to the growing parts of the tree, the cambium layer, the sapwood and the heartwood.

The cambium layer is the layer of cells just under the bark. This layer adds a new ring of wood inside and a new layer of bark outside each year. It is the only growing part of the trunk.

The sapwood conducts the water and food material from the roots to the leaves where it is manufactured into the type of food the tree can use. The heartwood merely serves to give the tree strength.

PCA has new high in serving farmers

Production Credit Associations reached a new high peak in credit service to agriculture on July 1, 1960, with over \$183 million in loan volume outstanding in the 82 production credit associations in the Third Farm Credit (Fla., Ga., N. C., and S. C.) District, an increase of more than \$26 million over a year ago, Josh T. Nessmith, General Manager of the Statesboro Production Credit Association, who has just returned from the meeting of PCA Executive Committees held at Atlanta, Ga., reported that the 26 PCAs in Georgia will serve about 12,000 Georgia farmers with credit amounting to about \$55 this year.

He also said, "Reorganization of farm business for more efficient production is resulting in a continued increase in capital purpose credit extended by PCAs, and this type credit now accounts for approximately one-third of the total credit extended by PCAs."

Roy E. Proctor, Department of Agricultural Economics, University of Georgia, was guest speaker at the meeting and spoke on "Financing Farmers in the Sixties."

Current topics important to the Credit Bank-PCA System were discussed by B. A. Darr, president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Columbia, He indicated that the 82 PCAs in the District are in sound financial condition and the future of Georgia agriculture will likely be characterized by the need for more capital credit and more operating credit, perhaps 5 to 40 per cent more in the next ten years.

Mr. W. H. Smith, president of the Statesboro PCA and Francis Trappell, assistant secretary-treasurer, attended the Atlanta meeting also.

The Statesboro Production Credit Association serves farmers in Bulloch and in Evans counties. Plans are now being made for the 27th annual stockholders meeting to be held Saturday morning, November 20th, 1960, in the Bulloch County Court House, and will be a joint meeting with the Federal Land Bank Association.

Local BPW 'for' Amendments No. 13 and 14

The Statesboro Business and Professional Women's Club, in its regular business session on Monday evening, October 17, officially endorsed Amendments number 13 and 14 to appear on the November 8 ballot.

The Amendments are as follows: "FOR ratification of amendment to the Constitution so as to provide for repayment of medical loans and scholarships by service at Milledgeville State Hospital, Number 13, and "FOR ratification of amendment to provide for the granting of scholarships to physicians and other personnel for specialized training in the field of mental health," number 14.

The local BPW Club was represented by Mrs. Eloise Finnicutt, State Public Relations Chairman for the Georgia Federation of BPW Clubs, incorporated on Wednesday, October 19, at the Georgia Legislative Forum of Women, held at the Manger Hotel in Savannah.

Dr. James B. Craig, Director of Educational Services, Milledgeville State Hospital, was an afternoon speaker and brought home the need for the additional personnel that the passing of Amendments 13 and 14 will provide in future years.

Dr. Craig stated the present staff at Milledgeville consists of 50 physicians, 80 registered nurses, 80 affiliates, 50 social workers, and 1400 attendants to care for some 12,000 patients. Georgia ranks 48th and 49th in the National Social and Psychology categories.

It is felt that the passing of Amendments 13 and 14 are the most important things voters can do at this time to help Georgia's mentally ill.

AAUW hears Judge Akin of Savannah

The American Association of University Women held its first meeting of the new scholastic year Tuesday afternoon October 18 at the Frank J. Williams Center at GSC.

Miss Bertha Freeman, president of the organization, presided.

Prominent on the program was an address on "The Status of Women," by Judge Stella Akin, Chief Judge of Municipal Court in Savannah.

Judge Akin stressed the great opportunities that women now have. She reviewed some of the nationally recognized women who put facts in history. She named the sixteen women congressmen, some outstanding business and professional women and stated that half the votes now cast were women. She admonished the members of the AAUW to study carefully the ticket in the approaching election, make up their minds and vote.

She added that fifty-one judges of the United States are women.

Statistics show that 400,000 women of the United States are engaged in gainful occupations, "and Georgia women play an important part," she said.

Mrs. Dan Gray of Savannah was a visitor at the meeting. She and Judge Akin were both complimentary on the AAUW plans for the coming year, planned by program chairman, Miss Marie Wood and Miss Freeman.

They are now moving into the industrial building built by the Portal Development Corporation and will devote the entire 23,000 square feet of floor space to the manufacturing of children's better dresses in sizes one through fourteen.

Cari Classics Company is a new corporation, incorporated under the laws of the State of Georgia.

The children's dresses manufactured in Portal will incorporate custom-made features that are not to be found in any other children's garment on the market today. Mr. and Mrs. Rosenberg said, "Each garment will have its own button-in pocket which is a patented feature of Cari Classics. All of the seams will be French, seamed and clean finished. There will be no raw seams in the garment." Mrs. Rosenberg said in describing the new line of dresses, she added, "This unique and outstanding feature, together with exceptional designing and fabrics, complete the custom-made picture."

Announcement was made that applications for employment will be taken at the plant in Portal beginning at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, November 16.

Mr. and Mrs. Rosenberg, in a joint statement said, "We are proud to be part in bringing more industry to Bulloch County. In the seven years that we have worked and lived here we feel that we in Bulloch County should be proud of the people in this county and their part in making industry grow."

The Portal Development Corporation, which is to improve and develop industry in the Portal area.

Most of the stockholders of the corporation are from the Portal community. They began working on new industry for the community about three years ago. Since then they have constructed a modern building containing 23,000 square feet of floor space. It is equipped with all modern facilities to provide for an efficient operation under pleasant working conditions.

10,000 registered to vote in the Nov. 8 General Election

More than 10,000 Bulloch County citizens are registered and eligible to vote in the November 8 General Election. However, based on the 1952 and the 1956 election returns only more than one-third of them will go to the polls next Tuesday to cast their ballot.

In the 1952 General Election 4,721 Bulloch Countians went to the polls with 3,619 voting Democratic and 909 voting Republican, and 183 not voting for either party. In 1956, 4,318 went to the polls with 3,414 voting Democratic and 901 voting Republican.

The polls in the county will open at 7 o'clock Tuesday morning and close at 7 o'clock Tuesday evening. Mr. R. P. Mikol, Ordinary of Bulloch County, will supervise the election as provided by the law which states that the county ordinary will serve as election manager.

The polls in Statesboro will be located in the courtroom of the county courthouse. The ballot is like unto a bed sheet, it is that large, in addition to the state of candidates for state offices named in the state Democratic Primary in September, 1960, and the candidates for county offices named in the Bulloch County Democratic Primary in November, 1959, it will carry the names of the Democratic electors, the names of the Republican electors, a blank space for write-in electors, and the names of the independent candidates. Then there are the nineteen constitutional amendments.

It has been pointed out that citizens may "split" his or her vote. That is, one may mark the ballot at the extreme left side of the ballot and vote for the Democratic candidates for the state and county offices, already named in the state and county primaries. And then vote for the Democratic electors in the second column by marking X in the space provided, or vote for the Republican electors in the third column in the space provided. Or vote for whom you please by writing in the names of your own state of electors or
