

The first Thanksgiving Proclamation issued by the governor of Plymouth Colony, William Bradford, was in praise of God for rain which saved the crops. The small colony of settlers were already on rations of parched corn, and their crops like withered grass from the drought. Three was no time to send ships back to England for food supplies before the cold weather set in, and so in their extremity Governor Bradford called the people to gather to pray for rain to save their crops.

To this day descendants of the Mayflower will find three small kernels of parched corn by each plate on the feast table, Thanksgiving Day, which is eaten in silent commemoration of the Starving Tathers.







According to science, these people are fewer than one in a thousand, yet seemingly 80% of Bulloch County adults are afflicted with this strange malady.


