

### SPCA holds stockholders meet Nov. 26

At the twenty-seventh annual stockholder's meeting of the Statesboro Production Credit Association, held November 26, 1960, in Statesboro, Judge Henry H. Durrence of Evans County and Mr. W. H. Smith, Sr., Bulloch County, were re-elected to succeed themselves. This is the ninth time they have been re-elected, both being first elected at the first stockholders meeting held in January 1934. Mr. Durrence and Mr. Smith have attended 25 stockholders meetings, 150 directors meetings and each more than 1250 executive committee meetings to consider applications for loans, in sizes from \$50.00 to \$55,000.00. And with other directors have made the association's policy and directed its affairs through 27 years of growth and success as the financial reports indicate.

From \$25.00 invested by seven farmers and an investment by the Production Credit Corporation of Columbia, of \$40,000.00 (the last of this investment was returned in 1951), in December 1933 to more than \$250,000.00 in capital stock and accumulated earnings now owned by more than 880 farmer members in Bulloch and Evans Counties; from less than \$35,000.00 of loans made in 1934 to about 1 1/2 million dollars in 1960.

The number of loans made since organization are 13,896 for amount of \$13,799,685.00 with actual losses only \$4,019.25 in the 27 years. Other directors of the association are J. Lehman Dekle, Register; J. Henry Lefford and W. D. Sands, Daisy, Ga.



## County school bus service to be reduced CSS Womack says

This week H. P. Womack, Bulloch County Superintendent of Schools, and Leefer Akins, director of transportation for the county school system, make a joint statement in which they announce that the county school system will discontinue the operation of twelve school busses for transportation of children to and from school.

The new transportation program will first be put into effect in Statesboro, and after January 1 all children within the city limits of Statesboro will walk to and from school except a small group of high school children who live beyond a mile and one-half from the school.

The complete statement is as follows:

In order for any county in the State of Georgia to participate in the School Building money of Capital Outlay money, it was necessary that each county have a school survey of building needs, curriculum needs and transportation needs.

The Bulloch County Board of Education has complied with all of this. The survey shows that we need a new high school in Statesboro for whites and an elementary school in Statesboro for colored, some minor additions and repairs at Portals and also two processing plants, one at Southeast Bulloch, at Oricket and one at Portal in Statesboro.

The survey also showed what changes were needed to be made in our School Program as far as the curriculum was concerned. It was shown that we need to cut off twelve (12) buses in all, nine white and three colored. The white buses recommended to be cut off were one at Siltson, one at Brooklet, four at Statesboro, one at Portal, one at Register and one at Nevils. The colored buses recommended to be cut off were one at Statesboro, one at Willow Hill and one at New Hope.

This simply means that according to the State all children living within one and one-half (1 1/2) miles of the school house by the way the plane flies must walk; and also those living within a half-mile of the truck line must walk.

In order to comply with the State School Building money, each county must follow the recommendations of the State in this survey.

It is impossible to carry out this program at one time. So, we will begin as of January, when school starts back after Christmas, and work out. This simply means that all children within the city limits of Statesboro will walk to school except a small group of high school children who live beyond the mile and a half. As soon as this has been put into effect in Statesboro, we will then move out in the rural areas.

Due to the fact that the State has drawn the line in saying that all children living within one and one-half miles of the school house and one-half mile of the truck line must walk, then it will be impossible to use school buses owned by the

## Polling places announced for vote on cotton

With the December 13 referendum on marketing quotas for 1961-crop upland cotton drawing near, the Bulloch County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee today made known final arrangements for the balloting.

There will be polling places in all of the county's 12 cotton-growing communities, the committee announced. Notices showing the date of the referendum and the location of polling places have been posted in conspicuous places in the county.

The ASC committee also announced the names of eligible farmers who will serve on committees responsible for conducting the referendum.

Mr. V. J. Rowe, Chairman of the ASC county committee points out that operator, cash tenant, standing rent or fixed rent tenant, landlord of a share tenant, share tenant, or share-cropper engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1960. Further information with respect to eligibility to vote in the referendum may be obtained from the local ASC county office. On the day of the referendum, information on eligibility also may be obtained at the polling places.

W. A. (Bill) Bowen was re-elected mayor of Statesboro in the city election held on December 2. Mr. Bowen received 1,215 of the 2,009 ballots cast. Mr. F. C. Parker Jr. received 772 votes.

In the city council race, Henry C. Lanier received 1,261 votes to W. P. (Tiny) Hill's 731, for the place held by I. M. Foy Sr., who was not a candidate to succeed himself.

J. Brantley Johnson was elected unopposed, for the council seat held by Rufus Anderson who resigned to become clerk of the Bulloch Superior Court on January 1.

In a statement made after the election Mayor Bowen said: "I realize that I could not have been elected without the support of my friends. To all of them I want to express my deepest appreciation. To those who could not reconcile themselves to vote for me, I hold no ill feeling, acknowledge a person's complete right to vote as he or she pleases. I must say that I am pleased that most people do not concur in the character assassination type of campaigning which crept into the December 2 election. But all that is forgotten and it is my pledge to the citizens of Statesboro to continue giving them the very best of me as their mayor."

Both Mr. Lanier and Mr. Johnson in statements to the Herald expressed their appreciation for having been elected to the places on the city council. Mr. Hill in his statement pledges his support to Mr. Lanier and other members of the council and the mayor.

The campaign was one of the most spirited in the history of city politics. Despite a cold day approximately 82 percent of the registered voters cast ballots.

Six new trustees were well-welcomed to the board. They include Tom Gattis and the Rev. Marcus Jowers, both of Waycross, Bob Burgin, Culbert, Irl Blackburn, Newman, Tom Gurley, Thomsville, and Howard Collier, Griffin.

## C of C policy fixed on solicitations

This week Tiny Hill, president of the Statesboro and Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce, taking the community's money with them.

Mr. Gibson cited two recent cases where the Chambers of Commerce saved the business men and professional men of the city a lot of money by the proper investigation and then refusing to grant permission for the solicitation. "The investigation showed that these two 'projects' were just slick ways to con the public out of their hard-earned money," Mr. Gibson said.

Mr. Hill asks the cooperation of the business community of Statesboro and Bulloch County to help make the new policy effective.

Mr. Al Gibson, executive secretary, added that a placard is being given to every member of the Chamber of Commerce which reads: "Notice to solicitors. We are members of the Statesboro and Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce and will not consider requests for advertisements, contributions, subscriptions or the sale of tickets until the project is presented to the Solicitations Division of the Chamber of Commerce, 31 North Main Street."

Mr. Gibson pointed out that this means the Solicitations Division of the chamber will screen every application for a card of approval before it will be granted. "We want all the recognized and legitimate agencies, including schools, civic groups, and others who have worthy projects to know that this will not work a hardship on in any way curtail their routine and regular activities in asking the support of the business and professional people of Statesboro."

He added that the new policy is to be a buffer against the fly-by-night operators, the questionable solicitors for funds by
