# **To The Citizens of Statesboro:**

This is not the case, and we, as council men, resent the implications and statements that have been made.

We, therefore take this means of reassuring the citizens of Statesboro that no such preferential treatment has been granted our mayor, and further, that no attempt has been made on his part to receive preferred treatment. He has complied with all rules, regulations, and ordinances pertaining to the development of subdivisions. It is, and shall continue to be, the policy of your mayor and council to maintain the affairs of our city on the same high plane that this and previous administrations have maintained.

We sincerely regret the unfortunate statements made during recent weeks.

GOOD TOBACCO CROPS BEGIN AT THE PLANT BED You should use an area of rich, well-drained soil, preferably with a southern exposure and protected on the north and northwest by windbreaks. Prepare enough beds for the acreage you'll have so that ample plants will be available for a good stand of uniform size plants in the field. You'll need 75-100 yards of bed for each acre of tobacco to be grown. Disc and thoroughly pulverize the soil, then apply about one pound of plant bed fertilizer per square yard of bed. Work this into the top three or four inches of soil and immediately treat with methyl bromide or, there was been on the low of the partner all treat with methyl bromide or other weed-seed control chemicals. Destroy all weeds growing around the beds by thorough discing or burning. All beds should be left in the right condition for seeding.


Seed the beds at the rate of 1/2 to 1/4 ounce per 100 yards. After seeding, inspect the beds at least twice a week for the presence of pests. After seeding, inspect and the small plants begin to grow, it is good insurance to apply an insecticide such as a combination of 5% DDT and 1% parathion dust, or the equivalent in a spray.
