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Georgia gives Kennedy a big majority

ATLANTA (AP)—John F. Kennedy carried Georgia by 152,106 votes over Richard M. Nixon...

The official returns showed the Democrats received 458,638 and the Republicans 274,472. The vote of 733,110 was a new record as were the totals rolled up by both the Democratic and Republican parties.

A significant feature was the fact that the vote on the constitutional amendments ran for president. A veteran election official said the reason was that many voters did not understand the amendments and voted neither for nor against.

The rejected amendments would have added five members to the 10-member State Board of Education; put legislators on a salary basis; added the commission of agriculture to the State Board of Regents; levied an additional \$1 on marriage license...

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin H. Cox of Twin City, he was born in Savannah, Ga., on October 20, 1934, and is single.

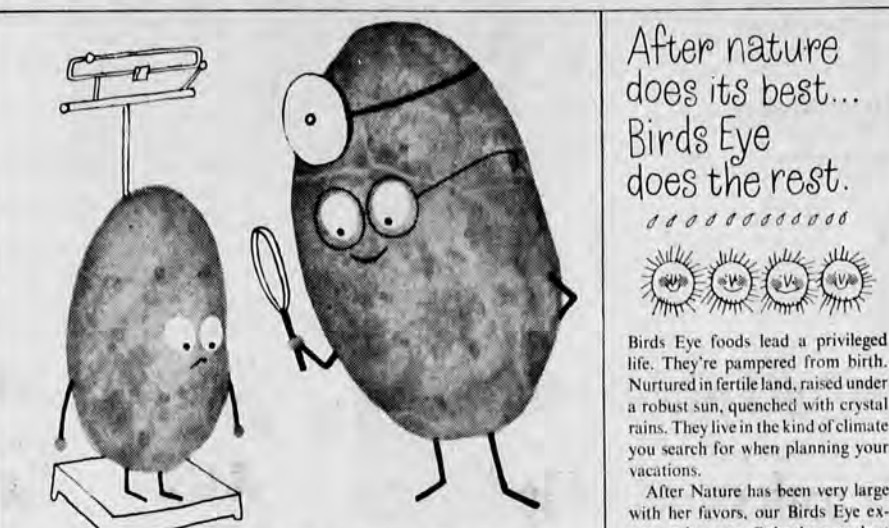

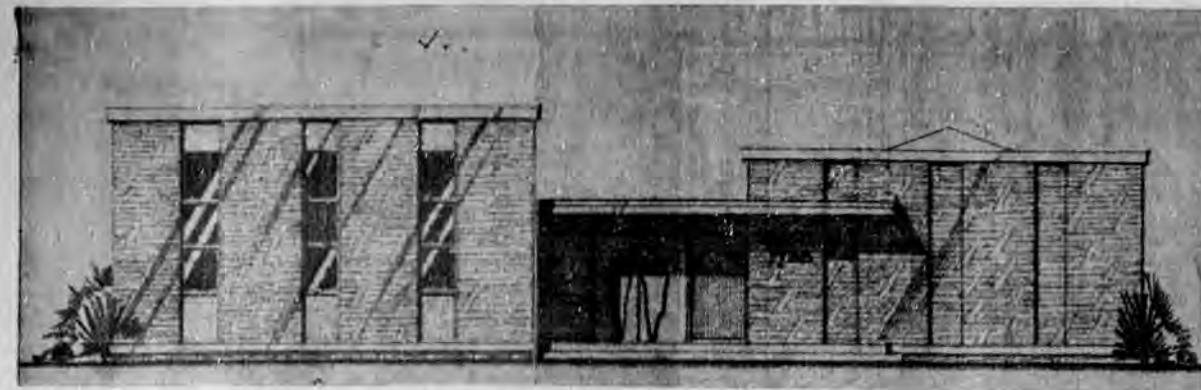

New Course In Home Nursing Is Offered At GSC

A new home economics course entitled, "Family Health and Home Nursing," will be taught for one month during the winter and spring quarters, according to Miss Frances Anderson of the home economics division.

The course, which is listed in the college bulletin as Home Economics 460, is open to all students and would be beneficial especially to home economics and health and physical education majors.

For the first two weeks of the class, the American Red Cross State Nursing Director, Miss Mary Elizabeth Faircloth, will be on the GSC campus.

The course will be taught from January 3 through February 2 and classes will be certified to teach a course entitled, "American Red Cross Home Nursing-Care of Sick and Injured." This course is also valuable for community service work with Civil Defense.

Any interested student may attend the class from January 26 through February 2 when the Public Health Nurse will teach a unit entitled, "Mother and Baby Care." Students should notify Miss Anderson before January 26 if they plan to attend the class during this week.

Complete-Mixed Or Free-Choice

Free-choice versus complete-mixed rations for swine feeding is probably one of the most controversial areas among swine producers.

Even though these types of feeding have been studied extensively, an examination of published experimental data indicates considerable variation in results, due in part to experimental variables regarding the animals, dietary ingredients, and environment.

A simple average of available data published by various experts 4 years on free-choice versus complete-mixed rations shows that pigs fed complete-mixed rations on concrete grew 4 percent faster but that the free-choice fed pigs made more efficient gains, requiring 3 percent less feed.

However, it took 9 more pounds of ration for each 100 pounds gained by complete-mixed fed pigs than those on free-choice.

Because of the saving in feed and the saving of the grinding and mixing cost, the feeding of free-choice rations on concrete, resulting in less feed and a saving of 60 cents for every 100 pounds of pork produced.

However, there is a trend toward feeding of complete-mixed rations and less free-choice. The main reasons for this probably are that a complete-mixed ration lends itself more readily to automation and it allows for maximum use of soybean meal.

REGULAR SAVINGS

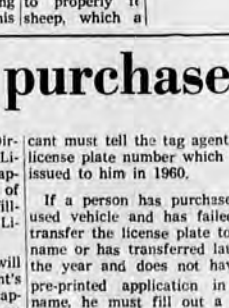

How to purchase your 1961 auto tag

The applicant must show proof of ownership on all new applications.

All trailer and motorcycle tags will be purchased in the county tag agent's office.

All persons purchasing a truck, trailer or motorcycle must fill out a new application.

All trucks up to 14,000 lbs. gross weight, will be purchased in the county tag agent's office.

"Gross vehicle weight" is defined as the total weight of the vehicle and load to be hauled any time during the year.

The applicant must declare his own gross weight, with applying for his truck tag.

All trucks with a gross vehicle weight of 14,001 lbs. to 20,000 lbs. will be purchased at the State Office Building, Atlanta 3, Georgia.

The tag agent's office in Bulloch is in the office of the Bulloch County Tax Commissioner in the Courthouse.

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
