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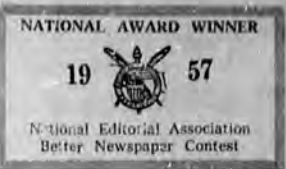

Stockholders of BC Bank to meet January 10

Wallis G. Cobb Sr., president of the Bulloch County Bank, announced Tuesday that the stockholders of the bank will hold their annual meeting on Tuesday morning, January 10 in the directors room on the second floor of the bank building.

Mr. Cobb wrote in his letter to the stockholders announcing the meeting, "1960 was a good year in the operation of your bank. A cash dividend totaling \$20,000 was paid in December after the 100 per cent stock dividend which was paid in March. Capital funds are at the highest total in the twenty-six year history of the bank, and we have continued adding to these funds from retained earnings, now making a total of approximately \$471,000, divided into capital, surplus, undivided profits and reserves."

GSC Eagles whip Stetson 92 to 78

Georgia Southern Eagles, led by the torrid shooting of Tracy Rivers, dumped Stetson University in a game here Monday night, January 2.

The Eagles bolted to an early 32-10 lead midway in the first half, only to find the High Hatters creep up to a four points deficit — 41-37 — at halftime. Stetson scored a basket at the outset of the second half cutting the Eagles margin to 41-39, but that was the closest that the visitors came all night, as GSC's "scrambling zone" limited them at 51 shots from the floor.

The Eagles, now 5-6 for the season make their next start Thursday in Johnson City against East Tennessee State before playing a home engagement against Oglethorpe University here Jan. 14.

B. McAllister, president, "is a sixteen percent dividend on our \$125,000 capital stock, or \$8 per share on 2,500 shares. We increased our surplus from \$200,000 to 275,000 which gives the bank total capital, surplus and undivided profits amounting to \$500,000," he said.

C. P. Olliff Sr., chairman of the board of directors presided at the turkey dinner served to the stockholders. This turkey dinner has become a tradition of the bank which was inaugurated years ago.

A complete statement of the bank's condition as of December 31, 1960, is published this week.

The Board of Directors of the Statesboro and Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce unanimously endorsed and went on record as approving a resolution which was adopted by the Parent-Teachers Association of the Statesboro High School at its November meeting.

The resolution was endorsed at the Chamber's January 2 meeting.

The resolution asks the Bulloch County Board of Education "to formulate and declare a specific plan for meeting present and reasonably foreseeable school needs . . ."

The resolution as adopted by the High School PTA and endorsed by the Chamber of Commerce board of directors is as follows:

A RESOLUTION "Whereas, the school facilities in Statesboro area of Bulloch County have become overcrowded and inadequate, with lack of space and equipment, particularly for laboratories for science and physics, and general classrooms; and

boro area are for additional grade school and high school facilities, including more land and building space; and

"Whereas, the school population on all levels is increasing rapidly, and the conditions mentioned are becoming worse; and

"Whereas, the Bulloch County has the means and the good people necessary to furtherance of the total educational effort, and there is available plenty of suitable land space on which proper and adequate facilities may be built, of such grade and quality as with require low-cost upkeep, and which may be planned with flexibility for meeting changing and expanding needs, and adaptable to multi-purpose use; and

"Whereas, the patrons of the schools in Statesboro area have an acute interest in the progress of the total educational effort for their children, and recognize the need for immediate relief in these matters; and

"Whereas, Bulloch County Board of Education is the proper body for implementing the educational program for Bulloch County;

"Therefore, be it resolved, that Bulloch County Board of Education be requested to formulate and declare a specific plan for meeting present and reasonably foreseeable school needs, acquiring suitable land, and beginning a building schedule, taking into account projected income and more efficient use of available budget monies.

"Resolved further, that these efforts be to the end that no student in Bulloch County will be crowded for school room space, or fail to obtain a well-balanced curricula in either grade or high school, inclusive of the sciences based on theory and adequate laboratory experimentation, and to the further end that each school child may be adequately and fully prepared in high school for either a vocation or for entry into college.

"Resolved, further that a copy of this resolution be furnished Bulloch County Board of Education immediately and its response urgently requested, and a copy of this resolution be furnished to other interested groups."

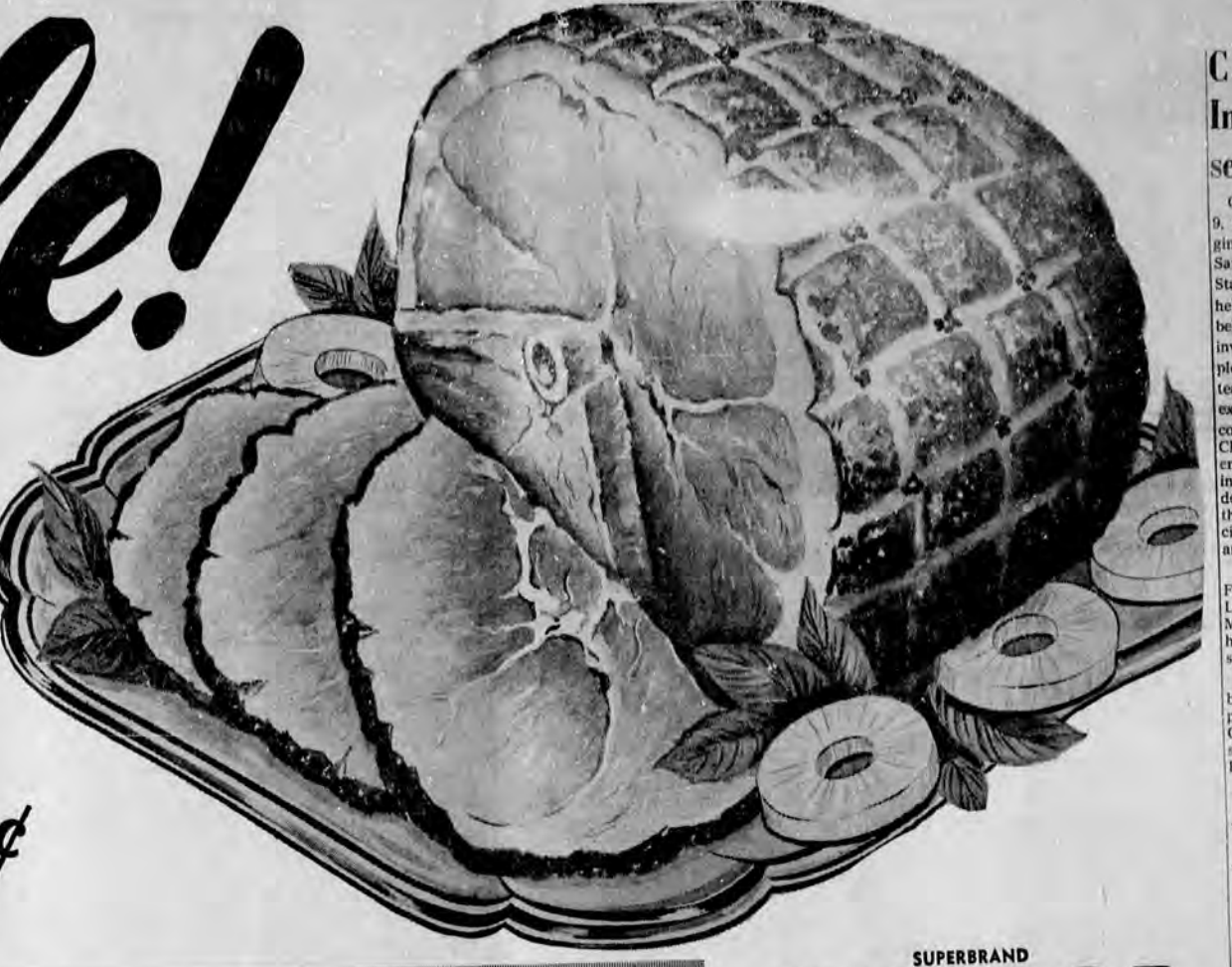
