## Free enterprise system is losing fight says Rockwell

DETROIT, MICH.—The fantastic burden placed on commerce and industry by Federal bureaucratic overregulation is strangling industrial development and destroying domestic business, a Pittsburgh industrialist said in Detroit on Tuesday, February 7.

Col. Willard F. Rockwell, chairman of the board, Rockwell Manufacturing Company, at the annual meeting of the Public Utility Buyers Group in the Statler Hilton Hotel, said that the greatest advantage our foreign competitors enjoy is the aid and cooperation they receive from their own government, as well as from our government.

"Our government through its bureaus, never ceases its attacks or its taxing, its political investigations through congressional investigations, and its threats of prosecution, which in many cases, would more properly be called persecution, are never ending."

FREE ENTERPRISE SYSTEM LOSING BATTLE

Since our politicians substitute our citizens to perpetuate late private business instead of

relying on laws and courts, Col. Rockwell said, our free enterprise system has been gradually losing its battle with government bureaucratic controls. He called on the American businessman to decide whether he wants to submit to the crippling and stripping of industry, or get into the fight to gain our rights!

"That PRESIDENT KENNEDY recognizes something is wrong with this situation was clearly demonstrated when, after his election, he commissioned Professor James Landis, one of the advocates of commission government and one of its experienced administrators, to report on the gigantic Federal bureaucracies. Unfortunately, Mr. Landis concludes we need another bureau or bureau to supervise all present bureaucracies!"

Federal bureaucracy, Col. Rockwell stated, has so multiplied that a U.S. domestic plant with 1200 hourly workers needs only 912 salaried employees while a U.S. overseas plant with 1300 hourly workers needs only 221 salaried employees.

"Why 10 per cent less hourly workers and 75 per cent more salaried workers? Because U.S. business must employ a bewildering variety of professional men especially professional lawyers to avoid violations of anti-trust laws, excessive damages assessed under workmen's compensation laws, a thousand and one other laws... where new rulings are confused and conflicting, rules are issued almost daily, and more complaints are received due to loose dog-tearing up shrubbery, overturning garbage cans and generally making up other persons' laws, than all other types of complaints combined."

The chief said that the Police Department has been instructed to destroy those dogs whose owners cannot be ascertained. In cases of known violators, those owners will be booked in the Recorder's Court of this city. He urged all dog owners to comply with ordinances for the safety's sake and to alleviate nuisance due to dogs which are a "nose."

The Board of Regents have authorized the official naming of the Arts and Industry Building and the new women's dormitory at Georgia Southern College at their monthly meeting in Atlanta on Wednesday, February 15.

The Arts and Industry Building, which will open soon, has been named the Joseph E. Carruth Building and the new women's residence hall will be called Mamie Veazey Hall.

Carruth, a professor of education at GSC for 19 years, was described by Dr. Shelby Monroe, associate professor of education at Georgia Southern, as "a gentleman and scholar, who has a keen interest in the students." Dr. Monroe added that "GSC hasn't had a mind like his since he left."

Native Mississippian

A native of Mississippi, Dr. Carruth received his A.B. degree from Mississippi College in Mississippi and his M. A. and Ph.D. from Peabody College. Before coming to GSC, he worked as an instructor, principal, and superintendent of schools in Mississippi. He also taught at East Texas College.

Mamie Veazey Hall, has been named after Georgia Southern's first dean of women. Miss Veazey began her career at GSC in the summer of 1929, joining the regular faculty in 1930. She was on the staff at the college when she retired in 1952 after almost 23 years of service to the school.

After her retirement, Miss Veazey made her home in Statesboro and later moved to Chattanooga, Tennessee, where she died in 1955.

Miss Veazey was a graduate of Lafayette College in Alabama where she received her A. B. degree.

## CEREALS FOR MEAT

Millions of people in the world cannot afford a diet high in animal protein; they eat the cereals instead of feeding them to animals. Cereals constitute two-thirds of the diet of people in Japan and India. Red meat and dairy products represent less than four percent of the Japanese diet and less than two percent of the Indian diet, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture reports.

## More soybeans are needed for Georgia

By ROY POWELL, County Agent

There is an excellent market for soybeans in Georgia. Bulloch County farmers can take advantage of this market by producing high profitable yields.

The principal source of protein for mixed broiler and other feed is soybeans. Oil mills use a lot of soybeans, too.

Most of the soybeans used for feeding broilers in Georgia are imported from other states, and Georgia farmers should not miss the opportunity to produce them here at home.

Georgia grew 93,000 acres of soybeans in 1961 with an average yield of 16 1/2 bushels. It would require 949,138 acres at this yield just to produce the 456,000 acres of soybeans used for broiler feed alone.

We could double the average yield by following recommended practices, according to University of Georgia College of Agriculture experimental data. Even then, it would take over 1,900,000 acres of soybeans to provide for the state's broiler feed needs.

More information on soybean production is available in the county agent's office.

## PRECIOUS RESOURCES BEING WASTED

Soil and water are two of Georgia's most precious resources, yet we continue to waste them at an alarming rate. The recent heavy rains and flooding of streams serve to emphasize the great need for conservation.

Land plus water equals life. Soil remains the main source for what we eat, wear, the homes we live in and the ultimate happiness. History records that civilizations can not exist unless they have good soil and plenty of water. Population trends indicate that 15 years from now our nation will need the following: 16 1/2 billion pounds more red meat; 47 billion pounds more milk; 20.7 million tons more fruits and vegetables; 20 billion more eggs; 100 percent more pulpwood and 60 percent more lumber.

All of these must come from the soil or are dependent on what the soil produces. We are today faced with the problem of conserving our soil and water so we can feed and clothe a population that will almost double in 35 to 40 years.

## Agriculture Builds Anew

EDITOR'S NOTE: Recently Mr. J. W. Fanning, Agricultural Economist of the University of Georgia's College of Agriculture, was the speaker at the Rotary Club's Annual Rural-Urban Day when many of the outstanding farmers of Bulloch were guests of the club. Mr. Fanning's talk put the farm problem in sharp focus. Believing that it can help the citizens of our community to understand better the problems besetting our farmers we are printing Mr. Fanning's talk in the next several issues of the Herald.

Most everybody is an authority on farming. I might say that a farmer who understands why a farmer who plants one grain of corn and gets 800-900 in return can't help but get rich.

They overlook certain basic characteristics of the farm business. Agriculture is a big business and stands as the basis for much business and industrial growth.

In 1959, Georgia farmers sold about \$7.5 billion in products. From crops, 394,500,000; livestock and poultry, 416,149,000; broilers, 164,500,000; Dairy, 50,000,000; Eggs, 53,125,000; Forestry, 100,000,000; Cotton, 71,000,000; Corn, 32,000,000; Tobacco, 54,000,000; Soybeans, 2,000,000; Peanuts, 62,000,000; Fruits and Vegetables, 40,000,000; Cattle, 70,000,000; Hogs, 69,000,000.

THESE ARE NEW DOLLARS IN THE ECONOMIC STREAM: b. Business created between the farmer and consumer in the handling, processing and distribution of farm products exceeds \$2 billion annually. The goods which Georgia farmers sell for \$700 million cost consumers \$2.7 billion.

Within these \$2 billion are hundreds of businesses providing employment to thousands of persons, purchasing vast quantities of supplies - and utilizing millions of dollars in credit.

## File to claim refund payments

Refund payments of Federal income taxes withheld from 1960 must file a return (Form 1040) by April 15, 1961, to receive a refund for those 65 and over." ## Family food buying

By MARY GIBBS, Consumer Marketing Specialist, University of Georgia Cooperative Extension Service

Q. What is a Grade A egg?  
A. Grade A and AA are top quality eggs. They have a large proportion of thick white surrounding the yolk and a firm, high yolk. They are usually delicate in flavor and are good for all uses.

Q. Can a small egg be a Grade A egg?  
A. Yes, the grade insures the quality of the egg, not the size. The words "Extra Large," "Large," "Medium," and "Small" represent the minimum weight in ounces per dozen, not including two ounces for the carton. A dozen small Grade A eggs must weigh a minimum of 18 ounces.

Q. Since Grade B and C eggs are lower in quality, what are their uses?  
A. Grade B and C eggs can be used for thickening custards, pie fillings, sauce and salad dressings; hard cooked to be served creamed or chopped in salads, and for scrambled eggs or with other foods such as mushrooms, onions, tomatoes and spaghetti.
