The survey was conducted last year by the Southeastern Forest Experiment Station of the U. S. Forest Service. It's the first to be made since 1951.

One of the greatest problems shown by survey is that hardwoods have replaced pine on almost 156,000 acres in the last nine years.

The area still growing pine, however, is much better stocked than it was nine years ago.

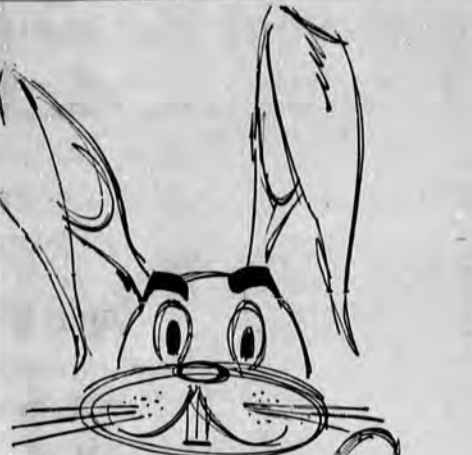

N. W. Rowand general manager, conducted the group on a tour of the plant including the various new machines which are now in operation in the machine shop and also the newly completed addition which houses the gas meter repair operation, the plating and shipping departments. Mr. Rockwell stated that the products manufactured here in Statesboro are in a very competitive market and face with rough competition both from here and abroad. The business outlook here at Statesboro depends largely on how this challenge will be met and will require the team effort of the entire organization to produce the best possible product at the lowest possible cost remembering always that the "Customer is the Boss."

### Winn-Dixie shows increase in sales

An increase of 4.31 per cent in sales was recorded by Winn-Dixie stores during the 36-week period ended March 31 compared with the corresponding period a year ago. The company, which operates a number of supermarkets in this area, now has a total of 529 retail stores and eight wholesale units throughout the South, compared with 511 retail stores and nine wholesale units this time last year. The Winn-Dixie 36-week sales volume totaled \$517,531,234 as compared with \$496,144,454 this time last year. Sales during the four-week period ended March 4 totaled \$59,877,116 compared with \$57,715,507 during the corresponding period of 1960, an increase of \$2,161,609 or 3.75 per cent.

throughout the period, and the fifth consecutive year in which stock dividends were declared. INTERNATIONAL OPERATIONS Rockwell's international activities, the Report stated, were the most significant developments in their long-range implications. "The rapid increase of industrial productive capacity in every part of the world has curtailed the need for American-made products. Lower wages and restrictive import practices in many foreign countries result in a price differential that can make the American product non-competitive in world markets. To protect these markets for Rockwell products the company made a number of carefully planned moves. The Report stated, "early in the year we formed a wholly integrated International Division with its own manufacturing, warehousing and sales operations. This was followed by an intensive survey of many markets abroad, much of which was conducted personally by our senior executives. As a result of information secured in this and other ways, we are substantially increasing investment outside the U. S. in plant and production facilities. Plans were made for our first Far Eastern manufacturing operation in India, and our sales representation was greatly strengthened in such areas as South America and Japan. We have integrated our Canadian organization into the International Division and are expanding our product lines in that area. All of these moves are based on the conviction that we can and must move selectively but aggressively into world markets."

### Keep good records for tax return

Taxpayers who kept good financial records last year should have no trouble preparing their 1960 Federal income tax return. District Director A. C. Ross of the Atlanta office of the Internal Revenue Service stressed today, "Complete records are especially important," Mr. Ross said, "to taxpayers who elect to itemize deductions in filing. "Accurate expense records also are essential if a taxpayer's return is selected for audit. "All records should be retained for as long as they may become material in the administration of any internal revenue law. "Another advantage," Mr. Ross declared, "is that taxpayers with good records can complete and mail their Federal tax returns as soon as they receive their W-2 withholding tax certificates, thus eliminating last-minute searches for such papers as the filing deadline draws near."

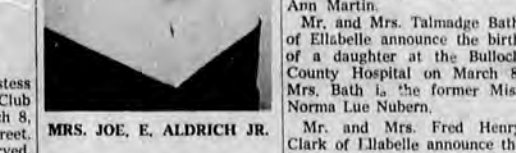

**REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON**

The report of the President's Commission on National Goals is an incredible document which makes one wonder how many of its signers actually read it.

The Commission was established by President Eisenhower to "set up a series of goals in various areas of national activity" and was composed of highly-respected leaders like Hugh L. Hunt, Dr. James B. Conant and Governor Alfred M. Gruenther. Its report, released late last year, is a hodgepodge of platitudes-coated recommendations for accelerated welfare state, expanded federal authority and greater international involvement. Said by the Indianapolis Star to reflect "a compromise between the hard insights of a few and the confusion of others," it is distinguished only by the enormity of its contradictions and the effrontery of its invocation of fundamental constitutional principles as justification for proposals which would destroy them.

The Commission lamented "pressures toward conformity" while applauding evidence of development of "a classless society." It called for "peaceful adjustment of differences of opinion" but advocated withdrawal of federal funds from schools, hospitals, airports, housing programs and private businesses which "discriminate on the basis of race." It acknowledged that education "is primarily a responsibility of the states" but insisted that the federal role must now be expanded "and all schools, whether under court order or not, must desegregate."

It maintained that "government spending in the economy should be limited" but proposed increased investment in the public sector. It contended that there is "no merit in a statistical race with the Communist nations" but recommended "a substantial increase in the amount of foreign aid." It stated the "basic foreign policy of the United States should be the preservation of its own independence and free institutions" but urged a "search for acceptable areas of accommodation with opponents."

ON ONE HAND it declared that "maintenance of our independence and way of life... require the most effective counter-measure while endorsing on the other 'trade, cultural exchanges and occasional technical assistance' (as) useful policies toward Communist-dominated peoples."

The report is replete with many equally astounding examples of what is wrong with and what has happened to the national goals which the Founding Fathers set forth in the Preamble to the Constitution? Perhaps the one thing it proves above all else is the need for those who are preoccupied with seeking a new image for America to give some thought to the ridiculous image created by Americans looking for an image.
