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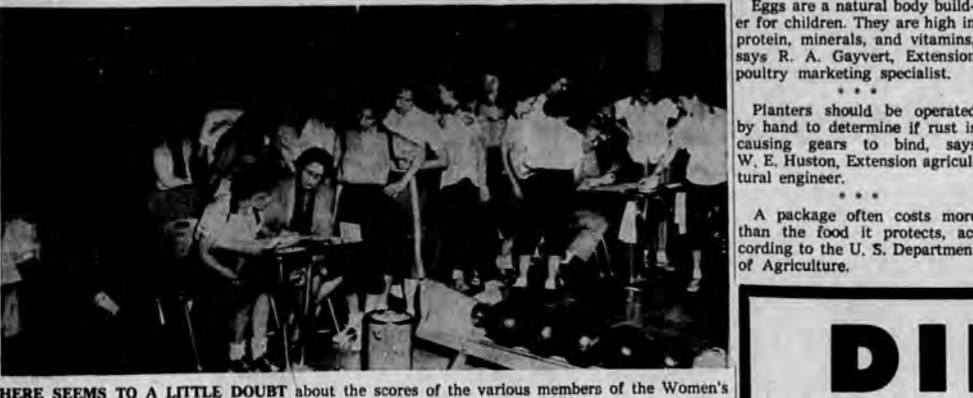

The sad truth is that the Communists have been at work for 40 years training professional revolutionaries (estimated by the Senate Subcommittee on Internal Security to number in excess of 100,000) while we have been content to remain amateurs in the critical field of political warfare. Our only answer to date has been a Peace Corps which proposes to pit inexperienced youths against hardened professionals.

WHILE WE MUST not relax in our determined efforts to perfect the world's most powerful military establishment, we nevertheless urgently need to supplement it with a program to develop a science of counteraction against Communist subversion and to train our diplomats, military personnel and citizens in its application.

Such a program is envisioned in the bill to create a Freedom Academy to teach key people from throughout the Free World how to recognize and cope with all the tricks of Communist subversion. This measure, which passed the Senate but was not acted upon in the House last year, has the support of both conservatives and liberals. Its enactment would be a well-spent investment in insurance against diminishing returns from the billions we are spending to protect ourselves from Communist conquest.
