**GSC gets sixth year education program**

Approval has been granted by the Board of Regents of the State University System of Georgia for Georgia Southern to initiate a sixth year program in elementary education. Dr. Henderson, president of Georgia Southern, has clarified the details of the program to move into operation in the 1961 summer school session.

The special planning and development of the new program, under the direction of Dr. Walter B. Mathews, was begun in the fall of 1960.

The sixth year program will be greater in scope, depth, and thoroughness of preparation than in represented by the state's degree. Through a cohesive, logically planned program, the participant is expected to achieve a level of specialization unattainable at the Master's degree level.

Dr. Mathews said of the new program: "I feel sincerely that the sixth year program for elementary teachers which we have designed here at Georgia Southern will help implement a new interpretation of the term 'specialization in elementary education.'"

The curriculum design of the new program is characterized by the following: Each student's plan of study is to be individualized as much as possible. The program is seen as a planned extension of the student's undergraduate and fifth year study and is to represent a logical, cohesive whole of six years of professional preparation.

Emphasis is to be placed upon achieving a balance in four broad areas: the school, guidance, research, and instructional areas.

Provision is made for the student to select an instruction in Northwestern University in Chicago to study in.

Other communities soon took up the observance from France and the custom of Rogation Days — days of giving thanks to God for His bountiful gifts for His continued blessings spread throughout the world.

In America, Rogation Days are the calendar of many churches.

Some 15 years ago a renewed and more widespread interest in the observance was fostered in the United States by the publishers of Farm and Ranch magazines. They suggested to a few religious leaders that one Sunday in each year be recognized nationally as a time to remind all church members of their obligations to their Creator in being a good steward of his soil and water resources.

By 1954 the observance had grown to nationwide proportions. Among the leading laymen who worked for this goal were the non-salaried Soil Conservation District officials in all the states. Knowing first hand of the importance of man's relationship and dependence upon soil and water, these farmers and ranchers and their clergy were helpful in reawakening a spiritual response to the responsibilities of the steward of the soil.

In 1954 the publishers of the magazine offered to relinquish their limited sponsorship of the Stewardship Sunday, later to become Soil Stewardship Week, to the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts. This organization's prime purpose is the conservation and development of land and water resources of the nation through organized local community effort.

Since that time the NASCD has continued to work with church leaders and other agricultural organizations and agencies in promoting the observance of Soil Stewardship Week.

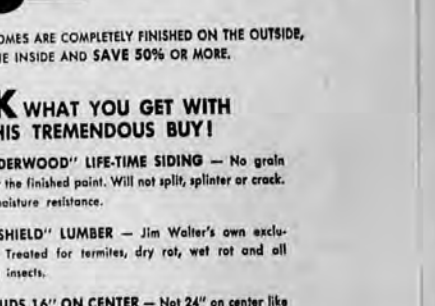

HERMAN TALMADGE Reports From WASHINGTON

IN THE NAME of "civil rights," the Justice Department has taken a step which threatens the most basic of all civil rights—the right of the people to govern themselves. Despite the fact that Congress on two separate occasions has refused to give the Justice Department authority to intervene in school cases, the Attorney General and his associates have filed a federal court suit to prohibit the State of Virginia from spending state funds for the operation of public schools so long as the schools in Prince Edward County which are under court order to integrate remain closed. The effect of the action is to dictate to the General Assembly of a sovereign state how it can and cannot spend public funds in the field of education. If successful, it would establish a precedent for federal control over any facet of life in which the Executive Branch for any reason might choose to intervene. THERE IS NOTHING in the Constitution of the United States which requires states and their political subdivisions to operate public schools or which authorizes the Executive Branch of the Federal Government to exercise any degree of supervision or control over the manner in which public education is or is not provided on the state and local levels. When the time arrives that the Federal Government, through

**Iron in washing water spoils eggs**

**IRON IN WASH WATER SPOILS EGGS**

Washing eggs in water of comparatively high iron content—5 to 10 parts per million—increases the rate of extent of spoilage.

Common practice on most egg farms is to machine-wash all eggs—not just dirty ones—to eliminate time-consuming sorting.

Bacteria used in the studies—Pseudomonas fluorescens and Pseudomonas ovalis—caused spoilage known as fluorescent sour in shell eggs. (Eggs were infected by immersion in a bacteria-iron solution.) By candling the eggs with ultraviolet lamps, this type of spoilage was identified by the bright, blue-green fluorescent pigments excreted by the bacteria during growth.

Field tests at several egg farms confirmed the laboratory findings. At one farm, spoilage was slight—one percent or less—in eggs washed in well water containing less than one ppm of soluble iron. However, at another farm, spoilage amounted to six percent a few weeks after eggs were washed in well water containing five to 19 ppm of iron.

Scientists have known for many years that washing eggs increases risk of spoilage. But, due to lack of basic knowledge



**Feed grain program report**

The second report on Feed Grain Program sign-ups shows 365,000 farms will divert 7.5 million acres from corn and grain sorghum this year. These farms had average plantings of 18.3 million acres in these grains for the past two years. Their diverted acreage will be about 41 percent of average plantings.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman said, "Farmers are responding to this opportunity to make needed production adjustments while still protecting their current income."

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**Soybean support requirements are explained**

Soybean producers will be required to maintain their 1959, 60 average acreage of conservation and idle land on the farm in 1961 in order to be eligible for 1961 price support on their soybean crop. William L. Lanier, Administrative Officer of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Office, said this week.

Farmers are urged to avoid increasing soybean acreage at the expense of acreage now under conservation practices. The requirement under the 1961 soybean price-support program, therefore, seeks to insure that any additional soybean production will be on acreage that has been used for crops in standard supply rather than from land

**Windfall for Bond holders**

In 1959 sales of over 124 billion pounds of mill wrought cash receipts of over \$4 1/2 billion dollars. This accounts for almost 14 percent of the total farm income in the country.

In 1954, there were 13 thousand establishments distributing fluid milk. This number had decreased by 23 percent in 1958. Dairy processors had decreased by 23 percent in 1958. Dairy processors had decreased by 10 percent during this same time.

**Livestock receipts**

Cash receipt of Georgia livestock reached a record high in 1959, according to the Georgia Crop Reporting Service. Receipts went up to almost \$421 million dollars.

This is a two percent increase above the record high of 1958 and almost nine percent above returns for 1959.

An 18 percent increase in poultry products and three percent rise in hog receipts more than offset declines for cattle and calves, dairy products, sheep and lambs and wool.

Returns from eggs were up to almost \$23 million—37 percent over 1959 receipts. Commercial broilers receipts advanced a little over \$17 million in 1960—an increase of about 12 percent over 1959.

Poultry and poultry products accounted for about 63 percent of the total receipts from livestock.

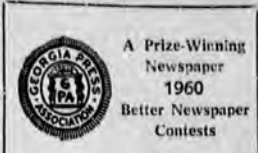

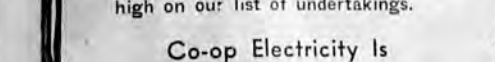

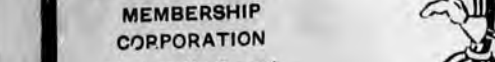

And thus it goes, the supreme task of molding the teachers of Georgia.

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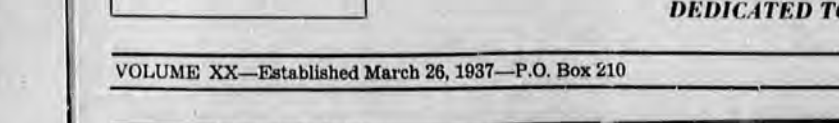

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# Strategic Air Command is bringing radar bomb scoring unit to Statesboro

A team of United States Air Force personnel have arrived in the city of Statesboro, Georgia to establish one of the Strategic Air Command's (SAC) Radar Bomb Scoring (RBS) units at Statesboro Airport. The Radar Bomb Scoring Detachment will be operating from mobile trailers and is similar to 20 other such units scattered throughout the United States.

The men that will man the detachment are career airmen, the majority are married, with families.

The first arrivals, under the command of Major Roger E. Cuddeback, came to Statesboro during the week of May 15. The mobile equipment is arriving this week and will be in position and operational by July 1 of this year. The unit is moving here from Douglas Macomber Airport, Charlotte, N. C., where it has been in operation for the past nine years.
