Georgia ACA for peanuts selects Pete Donaldson

Dr. Pete Donaldson, former president of Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College in Tifton and a native of Statesboro, has been appointed executive secretary of the Georgia Agricultural Commodity Authority for peanuts.

The newly formed Commodity Commission will supersede the existing Commodity Authority as soon as the Commission is in full operation and at that time Dr. Donaldson will serve as executive secretary of the Agricultural Commodity Commission for peanuts.

Dr. Donaldson is a well-known educator and friend of agriculture in Georgia. A native of Statesboro, Georgia, he was educated at the University of Georgia, Ohio State and was awarded a doctor of laws degree from Mercer University in 1961.

ATHENS, GA.—Harry Stopp, 5 Pittmore Road, Statesboro, Ga., was elected Mayor of Gwinnett City in the city elections held on the first full day of the 1961 Georgia Boys State. This session is being held on the campus of the University of Georgia with the American Legion, Department of Georgia, as sponsor. Mayor Stopp was sponsored by American Legion Post 90, Statesboro, as one of their many American activities. He is one of 318 boys studying the operation and function of City, County and State government at Boys State this week.



Herman Talmadge Reports From Washington

Mr. William B. Steers, of Hamilton, Ga., is Director of this program with Mr. Francis Trapnell, of Statesboro, as Dean of Counselors. They are assisted by a staff made up of Legionnaires, Armed Forces personnel and representatives of the various branches of state government. Many incumbent office holders come in during the week to give the boys first-hand information on the duties of their particular offices and enactments of laws.

Mayor Stopp is the son of Dr. and Mrs. G. H. Stopp of Statesboro.

A TWO-STAGE assault on the right of Southern people to run their own affairs is being planned in Congress for this year. The strategy calls for action this year further watering down the Senate rule governing limitation of debate and enactment next year of another force bill in the field of civil rights. The proposed rule change would reduce from two-thirds to three-fifths the number of Senators required to impose gag rule—a revision which, with all 100 Senators present and voting, would mean that 60 instead of 67 Senators could cut off debate. The likely vehicle for new legislative rights is the bi-partisan package of anti-South proposals introduced recently by Senator Joseph Clark of Pennsylvania and Congressman Emanuel Celler of New York.

THE CLARK-CELLER bills, if enacted as introduced, would establish an absolute federal dictatorship over every facet of human conduct. They would require all counties in the South to submit school desegregation plans and make the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare a czar to approve and enforce them. They would give the Attorney General unlimited authority to go into court and require compliance with his notions of civil rights and would establish a FEPC to tell every business in the country whom it could and could not hire and fire.

The decision to aim the initial attack against free debate in the Senate is a recognition of the fact that the only way punitive and coercive laws requiring unyielding conformity in human relations can be enacted is through short circuiting that check-and-balance-of constitutional government which stands as the last safeguard of local self-government in this country. It means that those Senators who believe the Constitution of the United States means what it says when it reserves to the people the right to determine their own destiny in all areas not specifically delegated to the Federal Government must make a do-or-die stand on that point this year.

THERE CAN BE no further compromise of the constitutional power of Senators to protect the rights and interests of their states and constituents through talking issues out before the country on the floor of the United States Senate if our republican concept of limited national government with ultimate power in the hands of the states and the people is to prevail.

Unfortunately for the future of our nation the ranks of those in the Senate who believe in that concept have grown thin and weary. The only promise which I, as one of them, can make is that it will not be thrown into the discard so long as I can stand on my two feet and uphold it.
