Leroy Bird and son put on cotton gin demonstration

A demonstration was given at Leroy T. Bird and Son Ginery in Portal on Wednesday afternoon, August 2, showing the effectiveness of the new ginning system which they have just completed installing.
Four bales of extremely rough, trashy hard and machine picked cotton were ginned to demonstrate the cleaning ability of the equipment. A large group of farmers attended the demonstration. Comments on these attending were highly complimentary of the sample of the cotton.
This modern Lummas ginning system for hand and especially mechanically picked cotton consists of New Super 88 double moting gins, New S. R. Threshing extractor, double lint cleaning, stick and green leaf machine, drier, and several other machines for cleaning and drying machine and hand picked cotton.
Conducting the very impressive demonstration were factory personnel from the Lummas Cotton Gin Company home office in Columbus. They were Mr. R. A. Briscoe, Sales Representative and engineer, and Mr. Charles Campbell, Field Demonstration and Serviceman.

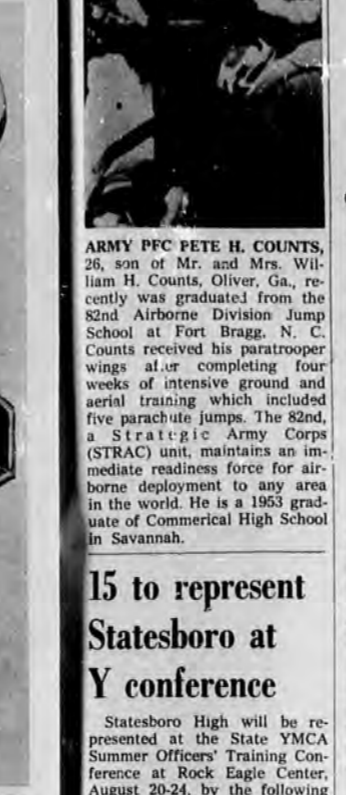
