Spalding County

In a gala 1951 Centennial, Spalding County celebrated "100 Years of Progress." Spalding was first in Georgia to have a concrete thoroughfare from county line to county line. Spalding developed Stoneville No. 2 cottonseed—to-day used to grow 90% of Georgia's cotton crop. Griffin is the home of the world's largest pimiento packing plant, the second largest towel mills, and hosiery and knitting mills. Orchard Hill has fine grain elevators and a meat packing plant. The Georgia Experiment Station in Griffin is of special value to this excellent agricultural county.
