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## Farm Bureau News

### Expansion Program of the Ivanhoe Community Club About Completed

The new stone for heating the Ivanhoe club house just about finishes the expansion program of the present, C. M. Graham, president of the club, started at the meeting Friday night.

Some months ago the group elected to enlarge their meeting facilities and added a screened shed. There is a little more work to do on the shed, Mr. Graham explained.

In a review of the recent report from the Coastal Plain Experiment Station, Tifton, on corn performance tests, it was pointed out that Dixie 18 has an outstanding record in yield and resistance to lodging, and has a very good record for weevil resistance. At the present time it is the only yellow hybrid that can be recommended for the Coastal Plain.

Coker 811, Florida W-1 and Georgia 281 are white hybrids that are recommended for this area. Georgia 103 is recommended in the upper section of the Coastal Plain. The earlier maturing hybrids such as Dixie 11, Dixie 17, Dixie 33, Georgia 101 and NC 27 gave good yields at Tifton and can be used for hogging off where an early maturing hybrid is desired for this purpose. Corn belt hybrids such as Funk 988, Griffith 134-1, U. S. 13 and U. S. 82 are all 10 days to two weeks earlier than the other soft hybrids, but tests at Tifton indicated they will yield approximately 30 percent less.

In a report on the proposed rural telephones for Bulloch county, it was pointed out that clearing the toll facilities is the only problem facing REA before giving a final answer on the application. Congressman Prince Preston was assured last week that this detail should be cleared up not later than February 15. Congressman Preston has followed up the survey made here closely from time to time and helped to keep the application moving.

There were no other Farm Bureau meetings last week since it was the fifth week in the month.

### Preparation For Pastures Urged

Farmers in Bulloch county were urged this week to spend a part of the winter period preparing for and improving permanent pastures. This would be a profitable investment of time, County Agent Byron Dyer declared this week.

"The winter months are the best time to prepare for establishing permanent pasture and a good time to apply lime and phosphate to improve pastures already established," Mr. Dyer commented.

The preparation of the land for these pastures is very important, he continued. The land should be cleared and lime applied before beginning. The top soil should remain on the surface as nearly as possible during the working of the soil.

The application of lime and the preparation of the land now will enable the planting of seed when moisture conditions allow. The early seeding will give the pasture plants a chance to make more growth and become well established by the end of the first year, he stated.

Mr. Dyer advised farmers to make arrangements for seed and fertilizer as early as possible. Coastal Bermuda can be planted during the next two months better than later in the year. Generally, there is more time available to plant now than later. Too, moisture now in the soil will help to get a better stand.

### Early Purchase of Fertilizer Urged

It will be a good idea for Bulloch county farmers to purchase their fertilizer requirements early, despite the fact that the 1952 supply may be sufficient. This is the idea of County Agent Byron Dyer. This early purchase and storage of fertilizer is a good insurance against running short at planting time. This will also be the key to plentiful and satisfactory distribution of the plant food, he continued.

Fertilizer manufacturers will undoubtedly make every effort to supply farmers with all necessary fertilizers but many complications may arise during the manufacture and distribution of the tonnage desired, Mr. Dyer said.

He also reminded that the average grade of fertilizer is much

## U.S. Needs Civil Defense

### ORGANIZING THE HOME FRONT MEANS USING MANY SKILLS

(This is the first of a series of articles on civil defense, based on the booklet "This Is Civil Defense" prepared by the Federal Civil Defense Administration. It may be obtained from the Department of Commerce, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., for ten cents.)

After the explosion of an atomic bomb, the resulting fires could cause more loss of life and property than the blast itself. Therefore, getting ready to fight fires is a big part of the civil defense job.

Atomic bombing would cause great fires in the areas of the blast, and start hundreds of small fires in surrounding areas. With the regular fire fighting companies fully occupied by the main fires, people would have to put out their own smaller fires on the spot. If they live in target areas, they must know how to fight fires at home or at work.

At least one member of your family should be trained in the use of basic fire fighting tools and methods. Because women are at home much of the time, they are urged to learn how to put out fires in case of emergency. Teaching of householders to fight fires will be carried out by instructors trained by their local fire departments. Auxiliary or reserve firemen will be recruited to back up the regular companies. These volunteers will be trained by local fire companies, using regular equipment.

Your Warrent of your local civil defense headquarters will tell you where to volunteer for such training.

**Traffic A Big Problem**

The biggest police problem in event of enemy attack, would be the control of traffic. Another big problem would be maintaining law and order. These are the most important of the duties which civil defense volunteers would help perform under the Police Service.

Retired persons, with technical training are especially valuable, such as retired policemen and firemen. There are many jobs which women can fill better than men. Your local civil defense director will tell you what they are.

## Prince Preston Asks For 40 Cents Cotton Support

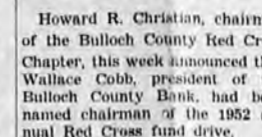
