Farm Bureau News
Denmark Farm Group Gets Pointers On Frying Chicken and Baking Pies

The best known methods of frying chicken and baking pies were shown the Denmark Farm Bureau Tuesday night by Mrs. J. H. Hinton, home economics teacher from Brooklet.

W. W. Jones, the Denmark president, stated that eating was a part of living and that such programs fitted in nice for the program. Mrs. J. H. Hinton and the women at Denmark and the motion picture on the activities of the University of Georgia were a part of the program.

Jack Welch, county health engineer, asked the men at Brooklet night to help get rid of the rats on the farm and around the community. He pointed out that such rats actually cost the farmer about \$20 each per year in food consumed and destroyed because the health angle. Mr. Welch stated that keeping rats out of the buildings and away from the home was good insurance against typhus fever.

Winter months bring rats inside the buildings and makes them easier to get at than in warmer weather when they are scattered in the fields and outside. Traps and poison, such as Warlin, will help get rid of the rats but buildings should be rat-proofed, he declared. Rats are best controlled on a community basis because they leave farms when control methods are applied but will go to a neighbor's home immediately. For that reason, Mr. Welch pointed out that it was best for all the people in the community to make an effort to get rid of the rats at one time.

Machinery sheds are needed in Bulloch county to protect this high-priced mechanized equipment. Judge J. L. Renfro told the Middle Ground 'Farm Bureau' Thursday night.

There is ample room in the great open spaces for all these \$2000 to \$3000 tractors and it is easy to park and move them out there, but farmers are paying a costly price for the depreciation caused by weather damage, Mr. Renfro thinks.
