Dan W. Hagan and J. H. Wyatt, working with County Agents Byron Dyer and Robert Wynn believe that the way to control to-bacco worms is to catch the moths that lay the eggs from which the worms hatch. They figure, "kill worms natch. They figure, will the moth that lays the eggs and there'll be no worms, then there'll be no damage to the tobacco by tobacco worms that didn't get to hatch from eggs that didn't get

laid." These people have set up moth traps, with a flourescent light on top with a light green background, with a bag underneath to catch the moths when they rebound off the green background after being attracted by the light.

Some nights the traps catch more than 50 of the big moths that lay the eggs which hatch out the horn worm and bud worm and bid worm eggs which attack tobacco plants. The traps also catch mole crickets, another tobacco plan

Though in the experimental stage, Mr. Hagan states that except in one small area, from which moths cannot see the light over the trap, there's no infestation.

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
