The checks, averaging about \$150 each, will total about \$5,800. Some checks run as high as \$50. L. T. Weeks, stabilization corporation general manager said. June 4, our police chief is making out a measly parking ticket in front of our office. While doing so a driver in a pick-up truck tears past going out West Main Street driving like a fiend.

# A Safety Council Made Up of Men and Women, Determined to Make our Streets Safe, and to Turn our Citizen-Drivers into sane operators, could do just that.

We'd like to see this civic club take on that job—organize a Safety Council. Then there's that business of home and business numbering.

At one time our Junior Chamber of Commerce was hot as a fire popper on that one. We don't know what put out the fire. Maybe it was too big a job to tackle alone. They made an investigation and let it go at that.

And our home numbering and business numbering system is still fouled up. These two projects we suggested to the president of one of Statesboro's active civic clubs.

Statesboro would be a better community if they were worked out.

We hope this civic club takes on one or both of these. Either of them is a tremendous job. But they will earn the appreciation of every father and mother whose child must ride a bicycle, or must cross a street. They will earn the applause of every citizen who wants to see our streets safe. **PMA Says More Storage Needed**

Bulloch county agriculture is in definite need of increased on-farm storage facilities, Chairman M. L. Taylor, of the County PMA Committee, said this week.

"Adequate farm storage," Mr. Taylor declared, "is an important part of farm and crop planning, and such expanded storage construction is within easy reach of farmers."

The PMA chairman pointed out that Commodities Credit Corporation guaranteed loans are available through the County PMA Committee to finance up to 85 per cent of the cost of storage facilities of sound construction and suitable capacity, strength, and design.

He explained that approved storage facilities will be needed by producers who avail themselves of farm storage price supporting loans, or purchase agreements, on 1952-crop peanuts. This year's peanut price support program, he said, will enable farmers to hold peanuts under loans and purchase agreements and to a better marketing job. In that way producers can take advantage of any seasonal market price increase above the guaranteed support price.

**Task Of Farm Bureau To Be Bigger Than Ever, Bob Mikell Tells Denmark**

The work of the Farm Bureau is being cut out and looks like the task will be bigger than ever, Bob Mikell, county president, pointed out to the Denmark Bureau Tuesday night.

Mikell pointed out the continued increase in the cost of everything farmers have to buy to make this crop with the prospects for a still further increase when the final effect of the steel strike is felt, yet all the while the things farmers have to sell and will produce for the market this fall are all declining in price.

Mr. Mikell discussed the prospects for cotton prices this fall, the decline in cattle and hog prices as compared with recent years, and the probable actual money loss on peanuts from former years despite the announced increase in support prices. The Farm Bureau has work to do and plenty of it, Mr. Mikell thinks.

Following the fried chicken supper, Herman Jones opened the Denmark meeting with invocation and Isaac Bunce read the minutes of the previous meeting. J. K. Luck, fieldman for the Cotton Producers Association in charge of the livestock work, expressed the

hope that a modern livestock auction barn would be ready for the heavy fall sales in Statesboro. All through the years livestock auction barns have been built and sold to the detriment of the farmer. The present plans are to build an auditorium here that will seat about 500 people. Mr. Luck said the county agent, stated that he had attended several of the community meetings in the county and that he did not believe any county in the state had a more progressive system for such gatherings. The community meetings are grand to have, if for no other reason than to just get together, Mr. Luck declared.

Ponds have been completed on the farms of Herbert Marsh of Middleground, and Charlie NeSmith of Statesboro. Preliminary pond surveys have been made for Dr. D. R. Dekle's farm near Register; Pat Brannen's farm near Nevis; and Mr. D. N. Shearouse of Pooler, whose farm is near Stillson.

Bill Bowen has an excellent stand of bahia grass in combination with Sericea lepedeza on his farm in the Westside community. A. P. Murphy, toward Clito, reports a bountiful harvest of fescue grass seed. He has harvested over a ton of seed per acre on 6 over a ton of seed per acre in this section and only time will tell just how big a place it will occupy. We do know that it will produce seed!

**How To Fight Pine Beetle Explained By Forestry Unit**

Advice on combating one of the biggest enemies to pine trees in the South, the Southern Pine Beetle, came this week from the Bulloch County Forestry Unit.

Although only approximately one quarter of an inch long, the beetle, especially during periods of drought which are sometimes encountered here in Bulloch county, wreaks severe damage to even the healthiest trees.

First signs of attack are spots of resin oozing from the lower trunk or exposed roots. The tree, if not treated at this stage, often is killed by the insect. Millions of board feet of standing trees are destroyed throughout the South each year by this bug and by other bark beetles.

Recommendations of the Georgia Forestry Commission and of the Bulloch County Forestry Unit call for prompt utilization of infected trees and attacking the bug with DDT insecticide, mixed half and half with 10 weight motor oil. This solution should be applied to the affected area, but should not be allowed to drip off to the ground to be taken up by the tree's root system.

Because the bug is active only in the spring and summer, timber operations should be planned for Fall and Winter. When cutting, land or piling green slash, the farmer should take care that no valuable pines are nearby.

Insect is drawn by the odor of fresh pine wood, and it multiplies rapidly in hot weather.

Bulloch county landowners can obtain additional advice on attacking the Southern Pine Beetle and other insects by contacting Ranger J. W. Roberts, Phone 501-L.

**Bulloch Receives 138,000 Seedlings**  
Forest tree seedlings shipped to Bulloch county from the Georgia Forestry Commission's three nurseries during the 1951-1952 planting season total 138,000. Guyton Deloach, Director, Georgia Forestry Commission, reported this week.

Forming that total were 127,500 Slash Pine, 10,000 Loblolly Pine and 500 Avicennia Cypress trees.

The Commission Director said the 138,000 seedlings shipped to Bulloch county were part of a total of 25,294,790 young trees which were shipped from Flowery Branch, Herty, and Davisboro nurseries during the past planting season.



The directors of the Bulloch County Telephone Cooperative group to complete the business of signing up subscribers necessary to procure the actual money to start construction of a rural telephone system by Saturday noon, June 21.

J. H. Metts, chairman of the board, predicted that those that are not covered in this group, as well as the farmer-owned switchboards, will not be able to get a phone in from one to two years.

The directors had 134 of the necessary 175 to complete the sign up at the meeting Friday and were confident they could get the others in a week. This does not include those that now have a phone on the farmer-owned lines that have been listed already as desiring improved facilities.

Mr. Metts explained to the board that several had told him that when the construction started, they would want to get on the lines. The board, according to Mr. Metts, will have to complete the lines as shown by the engineers and then they can go back to build lines for other subscribers if they have the money. If not, they will have to file another application with REA for additional funds, which may take from 12 to 18 months to procure as in this case.

The engineers are now plotting the subscribers that have signed for phones and making up the required blue prints for the system. Mr. Metts stated the blue prints and a listing on the subscribers will be forwarded to the moneying to procure the money allocated to the system.

2 Bulloch Tobacco Growers Trap Moths

They're trapping beautiful moths. And they're not members of a high school hobby class.

Dan W. Hagan and J. H. Wyatt, working with County Agents Byron Dyer and Robert Wynn believe that the way to control tobacco worms is to catch the moths that lay the eggs from which the worms hatch. They figure, "kill the moth that lays the eggs and there'll be no worms, then there'll be no damage to the tobacco; get tobacco worms that didn't get to hatch from eggs that didn't get laid."

These people have set up moth traps, with a fluorescent light on top with a light green background, with a bag underneath to catch the moths when they rebound off the green background after being attracted by the light.

Some nights the traps catch more than 50 of the moths that lay the eggs which hatch out the horn worm and bud worm and bud worm eggs which attack tobacco plants. The traps also catch mole crickets, another tobacco plant pest.

Though in the experimental stage, Mr. Hagan states that except in one small area, from which moths cannot see the light over the trap, there's no infestation, as well as in other tobacco growing states.
