Our high schools in Georgia graduated thousands of young people, the most of whom, at the time, had no earthly idea of what they wanted to do with their future, and still have no idea of what they would like to do.

We say—consider the teaching profession. Our Georgia Teachers College had 597 requests for teachers to fill that many positions. There were only 84 graduates to fill them.

Dr. Thomas C. Little, chairman of the Division of Education and director of the college placement service, revealed this week that the college received requests for teachers in the elementary school field and was only able to supply 22 teachers to fill these requests.

In other fields of teaching the supply was short of demand. Dr. Little suggests that many college men are not entering the profession or are leaving it after one year because they think classroom teaching does not offer a competitive salary.

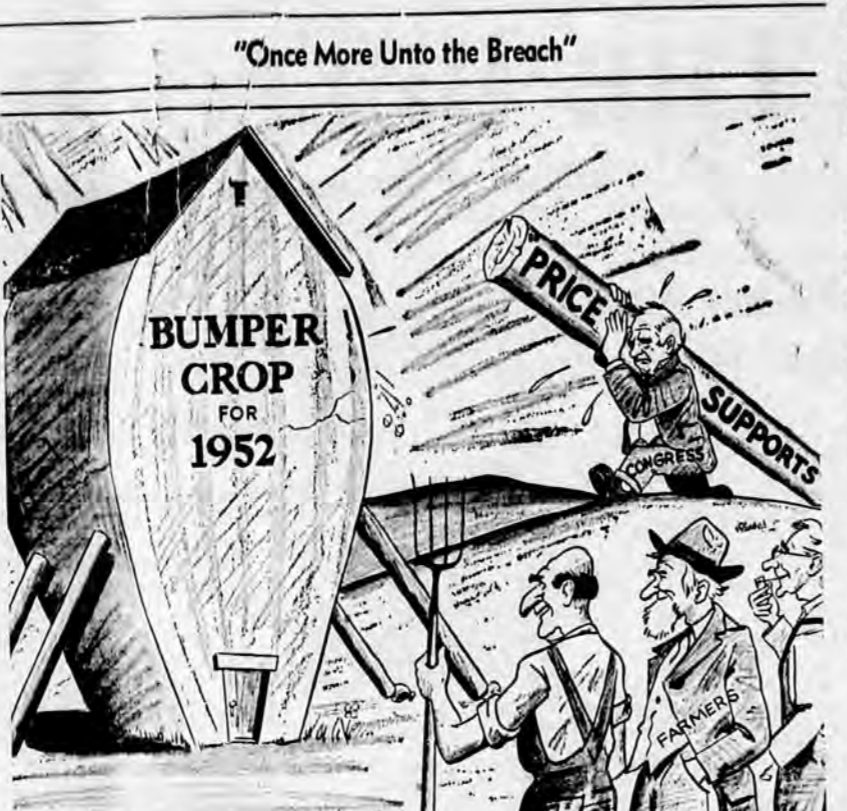

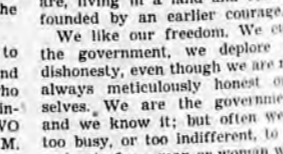
Independence Day Observance Sets Us A-Thinking

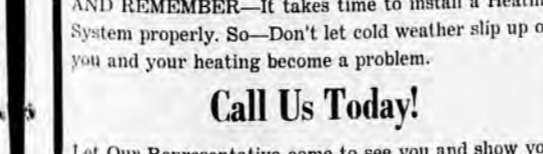

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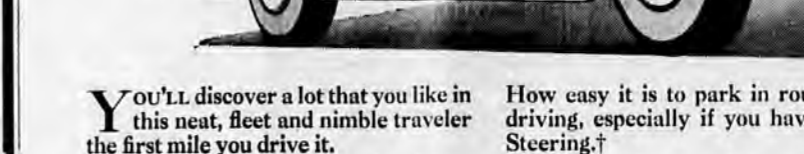

**1,949,088 Pounds Of Tobacco Sold Here First Three Days Of Market**  
A total of 1,949,088 pounds of tobacco were sold for \$808,967.20 on the Statesboro market in the three days since the market opened on Monday, July 21. Monday's sales amounted to 647,062 pounds for \$301,040.64. Tuesday's sales were 653,274 pounds for \$298,633.15. Wednesday's sales were 648,752 pounds for \$209,293.41. The unofficial average for the first three days is 46.122 cents per pound. The tobacco being offered this morning, (Thursday) seems to be better quality than that offered the first three days. Today's sales are estimated to go to 649,000 pounds.
