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Our Investment In Youth

THERE ARE THOSE WHO CLAIM that, way back when, they could distinguish a town kid from a country kid. They can't put their finger on just the difference, but they just knew they could tell.

Well maybe so, back then. But we defy you and you and you to point out any kid you don't know today and with assurance say, "he's a country boy" or "she's a town girl."

At the Statesboro Recreation Center in Memorial Park a kid's a kid. A boy's a boy and a girl's a girl. All kids are there to enjoy the wonderful facilities in the Summertime, the Fall, Winter, and Spring. Makes no difference if the kid comes from Statesboro, Stilson, Portal, Register, Brooklet, Nevils, RFD 1, 2, 3, 4, or 5. The Recreation Center is for the youngsters.

Max Lockwood, superintendent, of recreation at the Center, has but one driving force—to make the Center as attractive, as desirable as possible to draw the small fry there to develop their bodies, their minds, their talents.

At a meeting of the Recreation Board and Recreation Council last week, Mr. Lockwood made a statement to set up thinking.

He stated that, according to a conservative estimate, about one third of the children taking part in the recreational activities are from rural areas of the county.

As astounding as it may sound, the attendance at the Community Center is more than 100,000 a year, including those using all facilities and taking part in all recreational activities. (This does not include the hundreds of children who were brought to the Center as part of the extended school program this Summer.)

The Community Center is a meeting place for 4-H Club Youth, Home Demonstration Clubs, and other county activities.

The Statesboro Recreation Center is a community project. Conceived and born a community activity. It outgrew its community status and the City of Statesboro assumed responsibility for the budget. Under the direction of Max Lockwood the City has made the funds it has contributed go a long, long way.

The reputation of the Center is far reaching and a credit to Statesboro and Bulloch County.

So it seems fair to us that Bulloch County should buy into the Recreation Center. It seems only right that they should share part of the burden, since they have a vital interest in it—one third the youth using the facilities and taking part in the activities.

The county has an investment in its youth just as much as Statesboro has an investment in its youth.

This should provoke some thinking.

Pray With Humility

TELEVISION of the conventions of the Republican and Democratic parties brought many of the varied thoughts to millions of people. We had an opportunity to see people and watch them in action who have never been seen before. We had the privilege of sitting in the audience with people who heretofore had only been actors in the political show.

One of the things that most forcefully impressed me about the proceedings was the conduct of the invocation when each session was opened.

Now we Southern Baptists try not to be religious fanatics but all our lives we have been taught that when people pray they bow their heads in humility to God. That is the way I like for people to pray. Well, with only a few exceptions, that bunch of so-called religious leaders who paraded to the microphones to give the invocation, brought with them long, written speeches addressed to God. They stood there with head high, no sense of humility, and read their speeches.

I believe God paid as much attention to them as did the audience of delegates which continued to mill about, talk to each other and generally fail to recognize that the man was praying. He was reading a speech that had been written to as a part of parcel of a political program.

If this nation is to remain great and enjoy the blessings of God, it is imperative that we do not forget our humility and our sense of dependency upon a merciful Heavenly Father.

The most discouraging aspect of the whole affair was that those who were supposed to be setting the convention in tune with God and calling upon Him for guidance, were evidently forgetting that God was supposed to be listening in.

Centuries of human history have left lessons behind that should teach us the danger of independency of God and reliance upon our own strength.

Jesus gave us the parable of the vain Pharisee who stood in the midst of large audiences and prayed so that he might be heard of men and there was no sincerity in him. Most of these fellows who led the prayers during the two conventions reminded us so much of this Pharisee. We longed for someone to go there in humility and earnestness and say "Lord, be merciful unto us for we have all sinned and come short of the glory of God."

Bulloch County FARM NEWS

Farm Bureau Plans For Winter Grazing Studied At Ivanhoe Community Meeting

Plans for a winter grazing program were discussed at the Ivanhoe community meeting Friday night.

It was the only one of the community groups holding a meeting last week. Mr. C. M. Goshorn, the Ivanhoe president, stated that the dry, hot weather had ruined the normal feed crop and that the feed program to carry the livestock through the winter.

A series of slides, mostly on grazing programs found in Bulloch county last fall, winter, and spring, along with a few slides from the experiment stations, were used to show the methods of planting the various adapted plants here and the kind of growth that could be expected.

Where a surplus of Coastal Bermuda grass is available, it was pointed out that it could be fertilized now with some 200 pounds of soda or its equivalent and then grazed green or dry and then saved for grain.

Another combination that gave good results in some areas last year, on the lower soils, was fescue and white clover. Here again ample fertilizer is needed and not too much grazing the first year can be had.

One major recommendation included in the story called for using two or three times the recommended amounts of inoculation on the clover seed, all of them.

The seed bed should be thoroughly prepared and not half-heartedly done, and the seed drilled in and then packed with a cultipacker or some other equipment. This packing is good insurance on all small plots.

Disaster Loans Now Available In Bulloch

Mr. R. L. Vansant, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, announces that the Secretary of Agriculture has designated all counties in Georgia as disaster areas in which disaster loans may be made to eligible farmers and stockmen under the provisions of Public Law 38 (81st Congress). This designation was made because of the serious damage to crops and pastures as a result of the drought in Georgia.

Under this program, loans are designed to help an established farmer or stockman meet the expense of continuing his farming or livestock operations when he has suffered a substantial loss and is unable to obtain the necessary funds from local banks, cooperative lending institutions, or other responsible credit sources. These loans are not made to refinance secured or unsecured indebtedness or to compensate for losses suffered in the disaster. They are made to eligible applicants for production purposes when, with the help of the loan, there is a sound basis for successful operations in the future.

Farmers or stockmen in Bulloch County who suffered losses in the disaster and are unable to obtain operating loans from local or usual credit sources may file applications for disaster loans at the Farmers Home Administration
