Legion Advances Membership Drive

An advance drive for 1953 members of The American Legion in Georgia has already brought in 6,282 Legionnaires on September 17, a report from Department Headquarters in Atlanta showed.

The report shows that Georgia Legion membership for 1953 is running 1,945 ahead of the advance 1952 membership on September 17, 1951, when 4,337 had been signed in advance.

A Sidney Dodd, Jr., Statesboro, The Department Senior Vice Commander, is membership chairman. He has planned an extensive drive, in which he is asking all of the 310 Posts in Georgia to participate, designed to bring 60,000 or more veterans of World War I, World War II, and the Korean Conflict into the Legion in Georgia. There were 33,410 members in the state in 1952, more than at any time since 1946 when the veterans returning from World War II swelled the ranks to 56,022.

According to Dodd, Jim and women are eligible for membership in the Legion if they meet requirements as follows: 1. 1918, or between December 7, 1941, and September 2, 1945, or between June 25, 1950 to the date of cessation of hostilities as determined by the U. S. government or who, being a citizen of the United States at the time of his entry there, served on active duty in the armed forces of any of the governments associated with the United States during either of the stated periods.

In order to be eligible, however, a person's service must have been terminated by honorable discharge or honorable separation, or continued honorably after one or more of stated periods. Persons who refused on conscientious, political or other grounds to subject himself to military discipline or unqualified service, is not eligible for membership.

Anyone desiring to join the Legion should contact a representative or begin to test in membership is preferred. Dodd points out.

Keep Georgia A Free State

OUR GOVERNOR is blowing his top higher and higher over Constitutional Amendment Number 1 as November 4 approaches.

And when a governor of this great state of Georgia blows his top so completely he is bound to lose all sense of what is right and proper for the people. And in losing that feeling for the people he becomes more and more concerned with his personal desires.

The campaign by the Governor and his administration for writing the County Unit System into the constitution has broken down into a foul mess, completely unworthy of the citizens of Georgia.

Using race hatred, personal smear, and smoke screen statements, the administration is attempting to obscure the true issues.

The use of a leaflet now being circulated by supporters of the Amendment is one example of the extremes to which they are reaching.

The leaflet includes a picture of Mayor Hartsfield of Atlanta allegedly addressing a national Association for the Advancement of the Colored People convention in Atlanta. Mayor Hartsfield says the picture is actually one of him speaking to a convention of Negro Baptist ministers, and that Dr. Louis D. Newton one of Georgia's most beloved preachers, was at his side when the picture was taken, was painted out.

These tactics cannot obscure the real issues to the thinking people of Georgia. In Georgia there is only one party—the Democratic Party. The governor— whoever he may be—has complete control over the party. The State Democratic Executive Committee is always made up of the political supporters he names.

With it goes the right of any other party from getting on the ballot in this state. With it goes the right of the constitutional system of checks and balances in the government.

Go to the Polls November 4. Vote against Amendment Number 1, if you make no other mark on your ballot. We must keep this a free state—a democratic state.

Solicitation Control

SO YOU'VE BEEN complaining about the number of people who come in soliciting funds for a most "worthy cause."

So you're disgusted with the whole business of being played for a "sucker."

No we're not talking about the many worthy things for which you gladly contribute.

We're talking about the score of nuisance solicitors who come in seeking money—people you don't know—solicitors from out of town—beggars, pencil sellers, finger-nail file salesmen, fancy silk tie salesmen, itinerant high-pressure magazine sales girls.

Well you now have the opportunity to clear it all up and when a person comes in to ask you for funds for some "worthy cause" you can know that he or she comes with proper credentials.

The Statesboro Merchants Committee and the steering committee of the Statesboro and Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce have approved a Solicitation Control Program which if supported by the businessmen and housewives of this community the nuisance will cease or be reduced to a minimum.

It is simple in its operation.

The only cooperation needed on your part is to deal only with those solicitors coming to you with proper credentials which consists of a badge worn by the person which reads "Approved Solicitor—Chamber of Commerce, Statesboro."

This badge indicates that the solicitor has been properly and closely investigated—name, address, organization for whom the solicitation is made, total amount of money needed, amount requested to be furnished by citizens of Statesboro, the amount the solicitor is to receive, and dates of the campaign. A committee studies the information furnished and then passes upon the validity and worthiness of the "cause." If found to be worthy the solicitor deposits \$5 and is given the large badge which he wears while making his solicitation.

If a person comes in and asks for funds and he has no badge, you merely inform him that you're sorry you can't contribute to his "cause."

It's that simple. You—the businessman, the housewife—can make it work.

And if you make it work—you'll find a new freedom in the operation of your affairs.

Look for the badge before you give.

We are proud that we live in a community in which citizens take time to say they appreciate our efforts at furnishing them a newspaper they deserve.

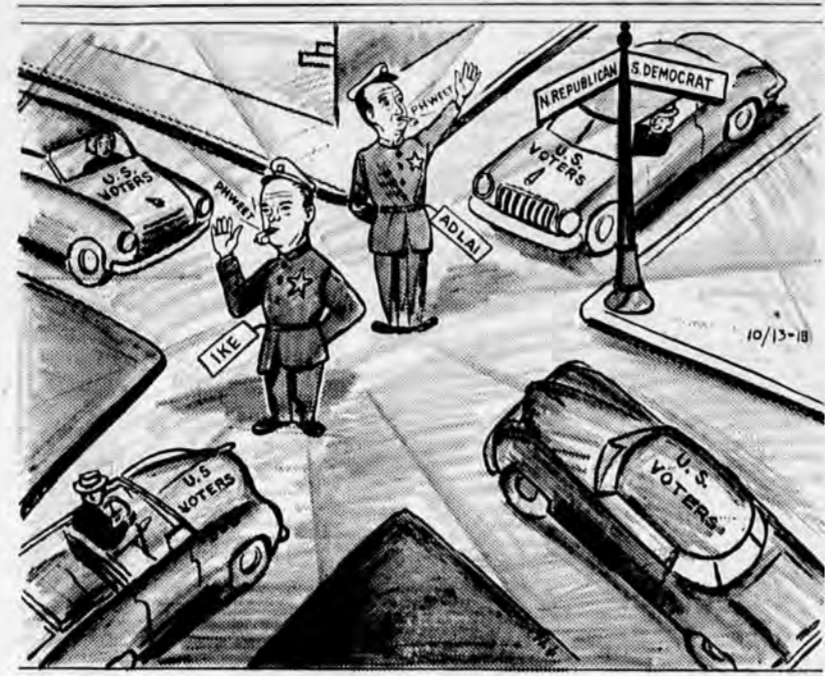

No Quota On 1953 Upland Cotton
Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan announced today that there will be no marketing quotas or acreage allotments on upland or extra long staple cotton produced in 1953.

Under provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, the Secretary is required to proclaim a national marketing quota by October 30 whenever he determines that the total supply of cotton for the marketing year which begins in that calendar year will exceed the "normal" supply. In the case of extra long staple cotton, a proclamation is required whenever the total supply exceeds the "normal" supply by more than 8 per cent. The "normal" supply, as defined in the Act, is the estimated domestic consumption and exports during the marketing year plus a carry-over allowance of 30 per cent.

\$600,000 Approved For Adding To The Bulloch County Hospital

An application for \$600,000 has been approved and the funds set aside to enlarge the Bulloch County Hospital, according to an announcement made this week by Hoke S. Brunson, chairman of the Bulloch County Hospital Authority, and Henry J. McCormack, manager of the hospital.

Representatives of William J. Chase and Associates, architects for the extension to the hospital, are expected here within the week to confer with the hospital authorities on plans for construction.

Tentative plans call for extending the length of the main building on the east end, and the addition of a section to the back.

Included in the plans will be an addition to the operating room facilities, an entire new dietary section, expansion of the nursery, more efficient communication system within the building, and with the outside, and various renovations in the present building.

The funds for the addition to the hospital are made available under the Hill-Burton Act.
