Rites Are Held For Howell Cone

Funeral rites for Howell Cone, collector of customs in Savannah for many years, were conducted at 10 o'clock Saturday morning with Rev. Leroy G. Cleverdon, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Savannah, in charge.

Mr. Cone, 72 years old, lived in Statesboro until he was appointed collector of customs in Savannah in 1933 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

He attended Bulloch county schools and in 1900, received his bachelor's degree at Mercer, and graduated from the University of Georgia law school in 1901. While at the University he roomed with Senator Walter George.

Immediately upon graduation from law school, he began the practice of law in Statesboro. He served as solicitor of the City Court from 1902 to 1906, and served as state senator in 1921-22 and 1927-28. He represented Bulloch County in the lower house in 1929 and 1930, and served as chairman of the Democratic executive committee of Bulloch. At one time he was president of the Chamber of Commerce here.

He was identified with the college here, having served as a trustee for many years before the college became Georgia Teachers College.
