**Roger Hagan Is Named Field Crops Champion At National 4-H Congress**  
A Bulloch County 4-H Club member who has won state championships in both livestock and field crops was named national winner in the field crops project at the National 4-H Club Congress held last week in Chicago. The announcement was made in Chicago on Sunday, November 30.  
Roger Hagan, 18, will receive a \$300 college scholarship for winning national honors. He is attending the thirty-first National 4-H Club Congress here this week—expenses paid—for copping the state title in field crops. He was named Georgia 4-H meat animal winner last year.  
Roger now joins his twin brother, Raymond, as a Master 4-H member. Raymond attended the National Congress last year as state winner in tractor maintenance.  
Three other Georgians were named national 4-H champions Saturday, even before the 35 club members and 11 adults left Atlanta for the annual Congress. They were Billy Davis of Lowndes County in leadership, Adrian Short of Harris County in community relations.  
The national field crops champion, who rented a farm and operated it himself this year, says he will buy a farm and balance it with livestock and crops when he finishes high school in June.  
On the rented farm this year he made 1,600 pounds of tobacco per acre, 1,500 pounds of peanuts, a bale of cotton and 50 bushels of corn. "Good seed, liberal applications of fertilizer, recommended practices, good management, and lots of hard work are my keys to successful farming," says Roger.  
This 4-H member began his club work in 1945 by joining a pig chain. The next year he bought a purebred gilt and decided to grow some of his own feed on an acre of corn. This convinced him that livestock and crops go together.  
In 1947 his 70 bushels of corn per acre won fourth place in a county contest, and in 1948 he made 80 bushels per acre on three acres. During the last two years he has grown around 15 acres of corn to help take care of his livestock projects.  
Roger got into the beef business in 1948 and refused to let hard luck kick him out of it. He bought two steers for \$315. A week after he presented to the church with the intention of making a national champion, he made up his mind to make it pay for both of them. A week before the county show and sale this one died too.  
Roger hadn't forgotten the tragedy of 1948, so he worked hard on his field projects and made up for the loss. In 1950, however, he was in the beef business on a profitable basis. One of his two steers won the reserve championship of the county show.  
In 1951, he added six steers to his other projects. Out of this lot he had the grand champion of the county show. It sold for \$1 a pound. All six steers graded prime and brought \$2,800.  
To go along with his livestock project, Roger has established 13 acres of permanent pasture. He now owns 15 brood cows and a purebred Friesian Hereford bull. His goal is 50 brood cows.

## Blue Devil Band Wins 1st Place In 20-Band Augusta Xmas Parade

The Statesboro High School Band pranced down Broad street in Augusta, Georgia, on Tuesday, November 25, before a crowd of nearly 100,000 people to win the annual Christmas Parade sponsored by the Augusta Merchants Association and The Augusta Chronicle and The Augusta Herald.  
The Statesboro band received a check for \$100 for first prize. The celebration was the official welcome to Santa Claus by the City of Augusta. Fifty beautifully decorated floats and 20 bands were in the parade. The Statesboro band was one of 15 high school bands from this section of Georgia and part of South Carolina.  
The Burke County High School Band won second prize and \$75; the Allendale, S. C., High School Band won third prize and \$50; honorable mention went to the Hampton County High School Band, Washington High School Band, and the Screven County High School band.  
William Russell, captain of the local band, received the \$100 check on behalf of the band from Jack E. Webb representing the two Augusta newspapers and the Merchants Association.  
The band is now making a drive for funds with which to operate the remainder of this school year. The drive is being directed by the Statesboro Junior Chamber of Commerce. When you are approached for support, remember the band is one of Statesboro's greatest assets and GIVE generously.

**Blue Devils Lose 14-12 To Metter High Bulldogs**  
The Metter Bulldogs came from behind in the fourth quarter to win a 14-12 victory over the Statesboro Blue Devils Friday night, November 22, in Metter. It was the final game of the season for both teams and Metter's first win over Statesboro since November 11, 1952.  
The first quarter was a defensive battle with neither team penetrating the other territory.  
The Devils struck first in the second quarter. Bobby Newton kicked 25 yards on a punt-play to the Metter 8. Two plays later Jere Fletcher got a pass to Gilbert Cone who was alone in the end zone for a touchdown. His conversion attempt was blocked by the Metter line. Half-time score, Statesboro, 6; Metter, 0.  
Statesboro received the kickoff at the beginning of the second half and marched to a tally without giving up possession of the ball. Newton and Albert Stewart swept the ends and drove through the center for a touchdown. Metter drove to the one-yard line on two ducks. Parrish dived over on the last down as the whole Devil line piled him up. Sonny Trappnell scooted across for the extra point.  
Statesboro received the kickoff and returned it to their own 35. Fletcher's two long passes were batted down by Metter defenders as the game ended.  
Final score: Statesboro, 12; Metter, 14.  
The Devils will graduate eleven regulars this year. They are Quarterback Jere Fletcher, Halfbacks Bobby Newton and Julian Waters, Fullback Henry Smith, Ends Gilbert Cone and Quincy Waters, Center Joe Johnston, Guards Eddie Hodges and John Webb, and Tackles Ronald Wilson and Johnny McCallammy.

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## Steve Pace Tells Farmers They Need Not Fear Farm Price Decline Now

Farmers need not fear too much decline in farm prices during the next two years, Steve Pace, former third district congressman, stated here recently to some 500 farmers attending the annual Producers Cooperative Association meeting.

The thing that worries most is the slant given to the cost of living, indicating that farmers are getting rich at the prices being paid them according to Mr. Pace.

He enumerated many instances where the present cost of living is caused by the increase cost of processing, handling and retailing farm products after they leave the farmer. The data given showed that since 1948 the price of farm products have actually gone steadily downward, yet the cost of living has gone upward all that time. Even the cost of practically every item used on the farm has gone up several points during this period.

One of the last acts of the past session of congress was to make price supports mandatory at 90 per cent parity for the next two years, Mr. Pace pointed out. However, cotton farmers have literally dumped this large crop on the market this fall and put more cotton on the market than it can take. Farmers knew better, but just did not do as they knew should have been done, Mr. Pace declared.

Cattle prices will stay fairly favorable despite the heavy increase in production, just as long as so many people are gainfully employed. When 62 million people are working at good wages, they are going to eat beef steak, Mr. Pace thinks.

Farmers will have to band together into a strong farm organization and into buying and selling groups, such as the Farm Bureau and the Producers Cooperative Association, if the decline in prices is halted at a favorable level, Mr. Pace warned.

Congressman Prince H. Preston lauded local farmers for the progress they have made in recent years and stated that he did not appreciate such progress so much before he had a chance to tour some of the agricultural areas of Europe.

Delmas Rushing was renamed to the board of directors where he is serving as president, and W. H. Smith Sr., renamed as vice president.

E. L. Anderson, manager of the coop, reported that the organization did \$525,000 worth of business during the past physical year and saved above all expenses \$34,871.

This organization opened a farm supply store here in 1944 with one car load of feed bought on the credit. The group now has \$82,000 reserve built up.

C. W. Paris, Atlanta, stated that the Cotton Producers Association was working with 38 mutuality such as the one here and that the organization had grown from \$2,200 in 1933 to a net worth of \$5,272,193.19 today.

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



The public is urged to hear this concert played by the champion band in its class, both in concert and in a half.

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
