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

So we present here the goals the Bulloch County Farm Bureau has set for itself for 1953. Let us pledge our efforts to help these citizens attain these ends.

1. Keep up all community meetings, meeting once each month, eating supper together and discussing their mutual problems.

2. Continue efforts to secure adequate telephone service.

3. We recommend that each community chapter conduct demonstrations in one or more of the following-Cotton, Corn, Peanuts. The contestants to use the best known methods of land preparation, fertilization, and cultivation on a small scale. A tour of these demonstrations on a community and county basis is recommended during the growing season. We urge the County Farm Bureau to set up at least \$210.00 in prize money for the county winners in these three contests and that this money be divided on a \$40, \$20, and \$10 basis in each of the contests.

4. Try to procure 100 per cent cooper ation with all Health programs of the county, particularily in having all "family milk cows" tested for Tuberculosis and Bang's Disease.

5. Cooperate with the County Fire Prouncontrolled forest fires, and the buildtimber in the county.

6. Help procure the enrollment of all boys and girls of eligible age in the 4-H clubs, and the Vocational Agriculture and Home Economics classes. Make plans to sponsor these programs in giving these

EISENHOWER SELECTS HIS CABINET

By Dr. Tom Alexander President-elect Eisenhower now completed the selection of hi cabinet. Comments have been plentiful from all quarters or these selections, but no one car properly evaluate the Eisenhowe cabinet without recognition of several important restrictions un-der which any president-elect labors in choosing his department heads. It might be fine admini stration to place at the head of each department that person bes qualified to perform his duties as inistrative head. Actually tical and other considerations dictate that professional qualifi-cation may be only one among many factors—and sometimes not the most important one. Geographic distribution and par-

ty allegiance are two factors that cannot be ignored. The same rea-son underlies both of these con-siderations—the cabinet acts as ad-visory body to the president. Hence it must be sympathetic politically with the president and must also represent various parts of the nation. Eisenhower has followed traditional patterns in selecting an all-Republican cabi with the single exception of Mar-tin P. Durkin, Secretary of Labor. He has also scattered the appointments over several sections, al-though the Northeast and the mid-west have fared best. Ezra Taft Benson, Secretary of Agriculture is from the Rocky Mountain Area and Douglar McKay represents the West Coast. The South is not represented in the cabinet proper bu holds one of the just-below-cabin posts in Robert B. Anderson, Secre-tary of the Navy. It must not be assumed that the cabinet can con trol the president. Its advice is only ust that. On one occasion Linc

found himself in disagreement with his whole cabinet and announced "Seven nays, one aye-the aye have it." However non-binding cabinet advice may be, it has been considered very important by mos of our presidents. Another factor which must h







Is has afflicted 57,000 men, women and children, making 1952 the worst pollo year in history. Thousands have been crippled, nany have died, others more fortunate have recovered.

We know not what 1953 may bring, whether there will be as many cases as 1952, or less, or-God forbid-more. But whatever comes we must be ready to fight this dread disease.

Georgia as a whole has been more fortunate than mos states this year, having fewer cases in 1952 than in 1951. But we have had more than 500 polio victims and several south Georgia counties have had heavy outbreaks—notably Chatham, Colquitt, Decatur, Dougherty, Tift, and Toombs.

Four out of every five polio patients received some financia aid from the MARCH OF DIMES, the fund-raising effort of the ational Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. This money, given by the American people, also goes for scientific research which is makin rapid strides toward the cure and prevention of polio.

The 1953 March of Dimes opened January 2nd and closes Janu ary 31st. Therefore, I, W. A. BOWEN, mayor of the City of Statesboro, do hereby proclaim January to be MARCH OF DIMES MONTH and urge all citizens to assist and support this worthy effort. (Signed) W. A. BOWEN
